General Garfield Still Receiving the Attention of the Multitude at New York.

The Georgia Democrats are Still Ballooning for a Candidate for Governor.

During the Last Day of his Fast Dr. Tanner Pronounces Himself in Good Condition.

Dr. Tanner Enters Upon the Last Day of his Fast Under Unfavorable Circumstances.

New York, Aug. 6.—Dr. Tanner entered upon the last day of his fast at noon. His pain is intense and ever since last night every move he makes either induces nausea or causes eructations of gas.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—The directors of the Chicago & Alton railroad company held a meeting and declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 1/2 per cent. on both preferred and common stock.

San Francisco, Aug. 4.—James Cahill, an assayer, this afternoon fired a harmless shot at Mrs. N. Scheline, and then shot himself through the head. Cause unknown. Dennis Hayes, a milk man, was shot dead by Michael Dolan in a trifling altercation.

Washington, Aug. 4.—Gen. Weaver, the presidential nominee of the national greenback labor party, has issued a circular to the members of the party appealing for contributions of one dollar and upwards to aid in defraying the expenses of the campaign from now until November.

St. Louis, Aug. 4.—The Kansas express train on the Wabash, St. Louis & Pacific road, ran through an open switch at Clark station, eight miles from Moberly, Mo., early this morning, and the mail and baggage cars were dented and badly injured.

Milwaukee, Aug. 3.—The Sentinel's Oshkosh special says Sheriff Morgan of that city started for Madison this morning armed with a warrant for the arrest of Rev. A. O. Wright, secretary of the state board of charities and reforms, on a charge of criminal libel in securing the publication of a statement reflecting on the physicians of the northern hospital for the insane.

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 4.—All reports show an immense democratic vote. There was no regular organized opposition in three-fourths of the counties and the democrats contesting for county offices with each other brought out all the voters.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—Daniel O'Neil, laborer in a brick yard, was arrested to-day and charged with the McMahon murder, which was committed a few days since. O'Neil denies all complicity in the affair, but Mrs. McMahon positively identifies him as the man who entered their bed room at daybreak, and on being discovered shot her husband.

Gen. Garfield's Serenaders. Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 6.—In the democratic state convention balloting for a candidate for governor was resumed to-day. The fifteenth ballot shows no change from the tenth taken just before adjournment last evening.

Telegraph Boys on a Strike. New York, Aug. 6.—The American district telegraph boys in the down town office struck to-day for an increase in wages. The strike caused for a time great inconvenience to bankers, brokers, merchants and business men generally.
