GOVERNOR PIERCE EXPLAINS. He Assumes the Whole Responsibility for the Veto of the Capital Removal Bill.

To the Press and Dakotian. Bismarck, Dakota, Oct. 23, 1885.—I find the following going the rounds of the newspapers credited to the Press and Dakotian:

Governor Pierce has placed on file as one of his excuses for vetoing the capital removal bill, a letter from Judge G. S. Palmer urging him to veto the bill, and representing that a large proportion of the people of his district were opposed to the removal of the capital from Bismarck, and were satisfied with the action of the capital commission.

This inference from the above is that I have been trying to saddle the responsibility for the veto of the capital removal bill onto somebody else and that I have in some official manner filed a letter from Judge Palmer as "one of my excuses" for that act, which is absurd.

I have never sought an "excuse" for my course, and no person can truthfully claim to have influenced me regarding the measure. I believed it wrong and I vetoed it. I have never seen a moment when I doubted the justice of my action or wanted anybody to share in the responsibility, the glory or the blame of it.

Bad or good, right or wrong, just or unjust, the entire burden is mine and I never hoped, requested or desired anybody else to assume it.

The paragraph quoted places a responsibility on Judge Palmer which in no manner, shape or degree belongs to him. Very respectfully yours, GILBERT A. PIERCE
