Charles Joseph Conlish, 19, of 540 Carroll avenue who was arrested Friday charged with the violation of Section 4687 of the General Statutes, the old Blue Laws of Connecticut, relating to disobedient apprentices, was arraigned before the City Court Saturday and execution of judgment was suspended.

TELLS OF BRAVE GIRLS

According to the story told by Conlish, he was working as an apprentice machinist at the American Graphophone Co. and was only getting apprentice pay for work which was fully equal to that which was being turned out by the graduated machinists, who were getting full union scale.

Prosecuting Attorney Alexander L. Delaney, who issued the warrant for the arrest of Conlish, said last night, "I studied the statutes carefully before issuing the warrant which was demanded by the Graphophone Co. officials. The law is upon the statutes although I cannot find that any case was tried since 1839, if then, in this state.

"The matter will be left entirely to the jurisdiction of the court for decision. It is one of the most novel cases within the scope of my experience."

It is thought that the Graphophone Co. is pressing this case because they have a number of young men indentured as apprentices at their plants and are endeavoring to make this case a precedent to govern their actions in the future when dealing with apprentices.

BONDS RAISED IN DAILEY CASE

Ella Dailey, the alleged shoplifter who is credited by the police with having stolen more than \$10,000 worth of loot from department stores in many cities as well as the local concerns, had her bonds jumped from \$500 to \$1,500 upon the advice of Captain E. O. Cronan, and when arraigned in court today her case was continued until next Tuesday, by which time it is expected all of the stolen property will be identified by the small army of store employees who are busy going over the carload of merchandise which has been removed from her home on Courtland street.

JIMMY WINDOW, STEAL MUCH CASH

A large sum of money was stolen from the home of Edward Hein, 163 Holly street, which was entered by burglars some time last night, according to a report made to the police today. The thieves entered the house through a rear window which they succeeded in jimmying open and apparently had a good idea of the inside plan of the house for nothing else was touched except the money, although there were many valuables laying around.


