Said improvement shall be constructed and made in accordance with the ordinance providing for the same and the maps, plats, plans and specifications for the same on file in the office of the Public Engineer of said Board.

Proposals must be made on blanks furnished by said Board and in compliance with the instructions thereto attached, which can be had on application to the Public Engineer, and must be accompanied by cash or by a check payable to the order of the President of said Board of Local Improvements in his official capacity, certified by a responsible bank for an amount of not less than ten per cent.
