D. 1917, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., at the city offices in the Central Life Building, in said City of Ottawa, Illinois, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened.

It is estimated that there will be about the following amounts of work to be done and materials to be furnished: 1,392 cu. yds. of excavation, 2,162 lin. ft. combined concrete curb and gutter, 44 lin. ft. concrete crossing curb, 4 crossing plates, 303 cu. yds. of concrete foundation, 184 cu. yds. of sand, 2,752 sq. yds. of brick pavement, grout filler for 2,752 sq. yds. of brick pavement, 3 tons of asphalt.

Said improvement shall be constructed and made in accordance with the ordinance providing for the same and the maps, plans, and specifications for the same on file in the office of the Public Engineer of said Board.


