

# FINAL REPORT ON S. E. KING ESTATE FILED WITH COURT

### EXECUTORS SHOW MONEYS EXPENDED FROM FUNDS LEFT FOR RYBURN HOSPITAL—\$31,316.84 PAID TOWARD BUILDING.

No one appeared to represent the city in the objection to the final settlement of the Solomon E. King estate or for any of the other heirs this morning at the hearing which was held at 10 o'clock before Judge Mills in the Probate Court. After obtaining a report of Attorney Charles Griggs for the estate, the judge took the matter under advisement in order that he might have time to go into the bequests and check over the amounts paid out by the executors.

Upon request of Mr. Griggs, when he has finished going over the records he will prepare a public statement of the moneys paid.

Under ordinary circumstances when the city failed to have a representative present at the hearing to either support or withdraw their objections the matter would have gone by default. Judge Mills thought that as the public was so greatly interested in the final adjustment, large bequests having been left for the erection of the Ottawa High school, the King city annex of Ryburn hospital, a Y. M. C. A. and a scholarship fund, the people of the city should have the opportunity of knowing just what amount of money had been expended for these interests. His statement will thoroughly cover those bequests.

Mayor Weeks, who filed the objection to the settlement in December, asking that he be allowed to go over the records of the estate and see just what amount of money was expended in the erection of the new annex building of the hospital, was busy in the Circuit Court with the DuShane city damage case and could not be present. He stated today that Mr. Griggs prepared a statement for him, showing the various amounts paid out by the estate for the erection of the hospital annex, which was 82 per cent of the bequest of \$50,000. This was the prorata amount paid to all heirs. He stated that had he been in court he would only have withdrawn his objections.

The report of the trustees, as presented by Mr. Griggs to Mayor Weeks, showed that the following sums of the total amount expended on the annex were paid by the King estate:

# FEDERAL PLATE TO LOSE SERVICES OF 2 HIGH EXECUTIVES

### E. F. ACHARD, GENERAL MANAGER, AND CHARLES CLAUDON, SUPERINTENDENT, TO RETIRE AS EXECUTIVES OF OTTAWA INDUSTRY.

Charles E. Claudon, who for several years has been superintendent of the Federal Plate Glass work, has tendered his resignation to the General Motors Corporation, new owner of the plant, to take effect immediately. Mr. Claudon has made no plans for the future. He expects to take a long and much needed vacation before again engaging in business.

The resignation of Mr. Claudon probably will take him from Ottawa for all time. He made his home here for the past ten years and has taken an active part in the affairs of the various Ottawa clubs. The announcement of his resignation was made last evening at the meeting of the Rotary club and met with much genuine regret on the part of Rotarians. Since the organization of the club he has been one of its most prominent members.

Before the sale of the Federal Plate factory a few months ago he was one of the principal stockholders. Since his marriage two years ago he has made his home in the Palmer apartments.

Officers of the General Motors are said to have made every inducement to Mr. Claudon to remain at his post in charge of operations, but he, feeling that he had a good long vacation coming, declined to accept the offers made him, some of which are said to have been flattering.

Mr. Claudon is admittedly one of the country's best known glass experts, and to his management is accredited much of the success of the Federal Plate.

It is reported, but not verified, that the General Motors have tried to induce E. F. Achard to remain as general manager of the local plant, but Mr. Achard, it is said, has declined to stay in his old position as executive head of the industry, announcing his preference for a good long rest before again getting back into the harness.

The new owners of the Federal Plate, it is expected, will send men here to take over the "keystone" jobs which will be left vacant by the decision of Mr. Achard and Mr. Claudon.
