

BEARS HAVE INNING ON CORN EXCHANGE

(By the Associated Press) Chicago, April 8.—Bearish sentiment predominated in the corn market today, at the outset, but the effect failed to last. The initial selling pressure was ascribed chiefly to possibilities that influential traders would be indicted on charges of having shared in criminal manipulation of prices. Spreading of the railway strike, however, was a factor in bringing about a subsequent rally. Opening quotations, which varied from unchanged figures to a decline, with May \$1.56 1/2 to \$1.64 and July \$1.57 1/2 to \$1.58, were followed by upturns all around that in some cases went well above yesterday's finish. Oats were governed by the action of corn. After opening 1/4 to 3/4 lower, including July at \$1.40 to \$1.42, the market sagged a little further and then scored a slight gain. Provisions showed a lack of support. Lard especially was weak.

Potatoes. Chicago, April 8.—Potatoes strong; receipts, 61 cars; northern white, sacked and bulk, \$7.25; Minnesota russets, \$8.

Wall Street. New York, April 8.—Trading shifted from one group to another in the course of the first hour of the morning session, but the stock market continued to advance. Familiar rumors of prospective stock dividends accounted for the further rise, and particularly in motor and equipment shares. Specialties were the outstanding features, notably Stromberg, Vandalin, Continental Can, Harvester, Industrial Alcohol and the sugars at gains of 3 to 10 points. American and Baldwin locomotives, General Motors, American Car and Republic Iron were included among the strong favorites, but United States Steel was under pressure. Profit taking cut into many gains before noon. Call money opened at 6 per cent.

COLLEGE ATHLETES AS FISTIC PROPONENTS

Boston, Mass. April 8.—A group of fighting champions, regarded as excellent possibilities for selection as representatives of America at the Olympic games, were developed at the national amateur boxing title tournament, which closed Monday night. Six are new holders of premier honors, while two of last year's winners who tried to retain their laurels were beaten back.

Tommy Murphy of Kansas City returned to the title list on which he appeared three years ago, as light weight champion and Sam Laguna repeated his victory of last year as the middle-weight master.

Principal interest in the closing of the national amateur boxing title tournament centered in the Yale's boxing leader Edward Egan, who won the heavyweight title which he won last year and also gain the 175 pound crown. He went down to defeat in two slashing battles, each a semi-final, that afforded the best exhibition of fighting spirit of the night.

HOCKEY AND FANCY SKATERS LEAVE U.S.A.

New York, April 8.—The American ice hockey and figure skating team, which will compete in the Olympic championship at Antwerp beginning April 20, started their overseas journey yesterday on the steamship Finland. The party of sixteen in charge of Cornelius Follows, president of the International Skating Union, including eleven hockey players picked from Pittsburgh, St. Paul and Boston teams. The two figure skaters are Miss Theresa Weld and N. W. Niles of Boston.

GROOM JACK JOHNSON FOR AN EARLY FIGHT

Los Angeles, Cal., April 8.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion of the world, now at Tia Juana, Lower California, will be given an early match either at Tia Juana or Mexico, according to "Cherokee" Tom Jones, who announced here today he had been engaged as matchmaker by the Dago Brothers, sport promoters and brother in law of Gov. Esteban Cantu of Lower California.

Johnson is in fine shape, as he has kept in training ever since his exile from the United States. He has been keeping training and what could be called hard training.

Several days ago he stood on the boundary line between the United States and Mexico, and shook his hand through the wire strands into the United States, eagerly grasping that of Deputy Sheriff Billy Silver, who is waiting to arrest him as soon as he comes across.

McLEOD WINS GOLF TOURNEY ON MERITS

Pinehurst, April 8.—Fred McLeod of the Columbia Golf club, Washington, D. C., the new United States north and south open champion, won his victory at Pinehurst yesterday strictly on merits as a sterling golfer. Tied with 146 at the end of the first thirty-six holes with Marty O'Laughlin of the Plainfield Country club and Louis Teller of Braeburn.

McLeod notched 146 for the last half of the journey, for a grand total of 294 for seventy-two holes. Walter Hagen, six strokes behind the leaders on the first day, with 152, played a phenomenal second round of 142 and missed a fifteen-foot putt for the title. Hagen split runner-up money with Clarence Hackney of Atlantic City, James Barnes of the Sunset Hill club, St. Louis, Mo., defending the title, finished with 291, whereas he won the championship last year with 298.
