

# TOMMY SHEEHAN PROVES SHARK WITH THE BILLIARD CUE

### BIG LEAGUE PITCHER DEFEATS LOU COLLINS IN CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNEY.—JACKSON DEFEATED KNUTSON.—PLAYS SMART POOL.

#### Tourney Results. Last Night. Sheehan beat Collins 100-50. Jackson beat Knutson 100-52.

"Tommy" Sheehan Ottawa's only big league ball player showed that he could play pool just as well as baseball last night when he won his opening match in the Pakenham Pool tourney by defeating Lou Collins Ottawa racehorse man by a 100-50 count. Even with beating him 2 to 1 Sheehan was not stroking right according to the way he has been playing of late at the K. of C. home. Of course Collins was not in his usual trip and continually missed easy shots.

Collins blew after runs of three and four regularly. He was given good leaver by the player who always plays position for the next shot and doesn't try to kill his opponent. "Tommy" skined before the crowd for his ability to make the more difficult shots and it was on the seemingly simple shots he fell down. It was the ball player's tendency to take the easy ones sometimes just a little too easy and "blow" on them. Sheehan appeared to have a crack eye for bank shots, combinations and long table shots. With his long lanky reach the big ball player could reach and shoot all kinds of difficult shots. "Tommy" Sheehan made no high runs but clicked off runs of 9-11 with regularity. Collins like Sheehan was not pulling considerable runs.

In the second match of the evening Knute Jackson put up a splendid exhibition and rolled over Art Knutson by a 100-52 score for an easy victory. Jackson was never headed and played superior pool all the way thru leading at the 50 mark by 50-28 and the running away for a 100-52 victory. Jackson's playing was superb and his runs of 10-15 were the high points of the evening. It was these runs that brought him an easy victory. Knutson shot good pool throughout but he was outclassed by Jackson.

With last night's matches the list of regular entries closed and the play-off for the prizes will start tonight with two feature battles. Clark who trimmed Hag; the pride of Marcellies will take on Jack O'Connell in one encounter. While the other match will bring together Kotsinos who beat Link and Baker. With two crack matches on the card tonight it is expected the house will again be jammed.
