HELD WARRANT AGAINST SMITH FOR EXTORTION

Sheriff Miller Testifies He Used His Own Judgment in Not Serving It.

It developed in county court yesterday afternoon in the testimony of Sheriff Miller, state witness against William Rice and Forrest Fox, defendants in liquor cases, that the sheriff holds an unserved warrant for the arrest of Alfred H. Smith, one of the investigators retained by the county to obtain evidence of liquor traffic.

In the cross-examination by Attorney Cyrus E. Dietz, Sheriff Miller admitted that he had never served the warrant, although it has been in his hands since early this month. The warrant charges attempt at extortion and was sworn out at the time Smith is accused by the defendants of having sought to obtain a sum of money in exchange for his promise not to appear in the case as a witness.

FAIL TO AGREE ON WAGE RATES

Cement Finishers' \$1 an Hour Rate Still Pending—Engineers Get Hearing Tomorrow.

No agreement was reached by the joint arbitration board of the Cement Finishers' union and the contractors in their meeting last night on the union's demand for an increase in wages from 70 cents to \$1 an hour, according to E. J. Burns, secretary of the Quad-City Builders' exchange.

Engineers Tomorrow.
This issue is scheduled to come up tomorrow afternoon, Mr. Burns said. The union is asking an increase in wages from 80 cents to \$1 an hour.

Practically all of the building trades unions are asking for the \$1 an hour rate. The plasterers are said to be demanding \$1.50 an hour. However, Mr. Burns said that this matter affects the builders' ex-

by the various building trades unions for increased wages is unchanged. The demands have come up at various times during the last few weeks but nothing final has been decided in any of the cases.

Strike rumors have been current but only one strike has developed. The Holsting Engineers' union called a strike several weeks ago but after being out for some time the men returned to work pending a decision before April 1.
