

ARRESTS IN HAYES COMPANY CASE

Landis Calls Concern One of the Worst He Ever Had to Deal With.

Additional arrests in connection with the exposures of deals by the late Daniel Hayes Land company, formerly of Rock Island, are being made.

The judge says the Hayes company was one of the worst that has come under his notice. The company's packing company was responsible compared to it, he declared.

Compelled to Refund. This money Judge Landis ordered him to refund to the receiver of the defunct corporation, and ordered the following telegram sent to the directors of the bank:

"I came out in the course of the testimony during the investigation of the Hayes Land company that you received money which you were not entitled to. By direction of the court I ask you if it is necessary to hire a lawyer to get this money back into the hands of the receiver of the Hayes company?"

Among the charges brought out in the testimony during the hearing were that farmers in Tennessee, Iowa, Ohio, and middle west states had been influenced to purchase tracts of California land through misrepresentation.

Police Pursue Jewel Thieves. Davenport police believe that they were on close touch at 2 o'clock this morning with the "second story" men who perpetrated the \$10,000 jewelry robbery at the home of Miss Alice French, 321 East Tenth street, Wednesday night.

Waterloo, Iowa, March 26.—Liberty bonds, stamps, bank stock and promissory notes, totaling more than \$100,000, stolen from a bank at Hanlontown, Iowa, Oct. 27, 1919, were found at Laporte City in a gunny sack which had been kicked about on a roadway for months.

NEW CHIEF OF THE FORESTRY SERVICE

Washington.—Colonel W. B. Greeley, who recruited the forestry troops for war duty in France and who for several years has been assistant forester in the U. S. forest service, has been made chief of the service, effective May 1.

Colonel Greeley has been in the service for many years and has been advanced successively to positions of responsibility in almost every crisis of the service. He was in charge of protecting the Montana and Idaho forests in the great fires of 1910, and during a large part of the recent war was in command of the 21,000 forestry troops and the 95 sawmills in France.

OPEN NEW HEARING OF COMPLAINTS ON WAYS OF PACKERS

Chicago, March 26.—The interstate commerce commission opened its hearing here today of complaints brought by the National Wholesale Grocers' association against the packing interests.

The grocers claim that the packers are engaged in the manufacture and sale of products not connected with the packing industry, to the detriment of the grocery business.

A number of railroads are also represented at the hearing because the grocers charged that by an agreement between the roads and the packers the latter had been given better rates and transportation than the average shipper.

The packing companies represented are: Swift; Armour; Morris; Wilson; Cudahy, and interior Iowa packers.

The railroads: Pennsylvania; C. & Q.; L. & N.; Missouri, Kansas & Texas; Norfolk & Western; Missouri Pacific, and Santa Fe.

IS IMPOSSIBLE TO REACH POLE BY AIR ROUTE

Expert Declares Traffic Gales Will Prevent Trip of Explorer in Plane.

Melbourne, Australia.—An airplane will be of little service in attempting to reach the south pole, in the opinion of Dr. Griffith Taylor, of the Austrian meteorological bureau, who was formerly an Antarctic explorer. Dr. Taylor said he believed that the expedition to the south pole to be conducted next summer by Dr. J. L. Cope would find it difficult to reach the south pole by the air route. He said: "Hurricanes blow for weeks in the Antarctic and can spring up in half an hour from nothing to 60 miles an hour. I do not think it possible that an airplane can rise above a blizzard. It can not stay up indefinitely and it can not descend."

Dr. Taylor is skeptical as to the mineral wealth of the Antarctic.
