With liquors of all descriptions retailing at prohibitive prices and the supply limited and hard to secure, scores of men and women are finding solace in drugs, he says.
 Morphine is most widely in use here, his investigations reveal although heroin and even opium is being smuggled into the country in finding a ready sale. The latter is large quantities, Mr. Murrey asserts, and some is finding its way into the interior.


