

ASSESSORS ARE GIVEN NEW JOBS

County Officers Gather at Court House for Instructions as to Added Duties.

Dog taxes will be collected this year by the assessors, except in the townships of Moline and Rock Island, which have a population in excess of 25,000, and are therefore governed by the ordinances of cities.

Official licenses, dated and numbered, describing the dog, giving the age, color and marking, and bearing the address of the owner, will be issued. Special metal tags, similar to those issued last year, will be given to each licensed owner, who is required to attach it to the collar of the dog. The taxes levied upon canines is \$1 for the male and spayed female and \$3 for an unspayed female dog.

To Tabulate Information.
The department of agriculture has furnished certain blanks and the duty of gathering and tabulating such information and statistics as is desired has been imposed upon assessors by the last legislature. These added duties were explained by Deputy County Clerk Clarence N. Isaacson yesterday when they assembled at the call of County Treasurer George H. Richmond. Such supplies as are needed were given them and the work will be started immediately.

Name Mill as Chairman.
J. F. Mill of Canoe Creek, was elected chairman of the body and various bases of valuation of farm stock and other property were considered, that there will be some uniformity in the results of the assessments over the entire county.


