

PLAN PROGRAM FOR CLASS OF NEW CITIZENS

Fort Armstrong Chapter of D. A. R. to be in Charge of Monday Evening Affair.

As a forerunner to the naturalization program arranged for Tuesday in the circuit court, the Fort Armstrong chapter, Daughters of the Revolution, are sponsoring a patriotic program for the prospective citizens set for Monday night at 8 o'clock in the court room. The general public is extended a cordial invitation to attend. All candidates for citizenship, and there are 78 listed in the class, are urged to be present and to bring wives and families.

The speakers will be Colonel Harry B. Jordan, commandant of the Rock Island arsenal, Rev. Vander Gulik of East Moline and George Mackay, naturalization examiner, of Chicago. Colonel Jordan will select his own subject. Rev. Vander Gulik has been asked to talk on "Why I Came to America." Mr. Mackay will talk on "The Meaning of Taking an Oath of Allegiance."

The naturalization exercises Tuesday are scheduled to begin at 9 o'clock in the morning with Examiner Mackay in charge. On Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock all former soldiers who were unable to become naturalized while serving in the army will be made citizens without any charge for the work. All that is required of them is that they present themselves with two witnesses to prove their contentions.

WILLS OF FIVE ARE PROBATED

Dr. C. E. Whiteside Leaves Part of Personal Effects to His Brothers.

Aside from the bequest of a part of his personal effects to two brothers, all of the estate of the late Dr. Charles E. Whiteside of Moline goes to his widow, Amanda A. Whiteside, according to the terms of his will admitted to probate in the court of Judge F. J. Landee.

He leaves to his brother, R. N. Whiteside, his double barrel shotgun. To Dr. R. E. Whiteside, a brother, he gives all medical books and instruments and office furniture, except a sectional bookcase and the books contained therein.

The will is dated Jan. 5, 1930. Ida Sophia Samuelson of Moline, a daughter of the late P. A. Samuelson of that city, is the sole beneficiary of the estate of the latter under the terms of the will in probate court. The instrument is dated Oct. 10, 1912.

In the will of William August Metzger of Rock Island, the entire estate is left to the widow, Katie Metzger. The will is dated April 20, 1912.

Elizabeth Scarr, widow of William Scarr of Rock Island, inherits the entire estate of the latter, according to the will admitted to probate. It is dated May 21, 1919.

All property held by the late Anders Gustaf Bergren of Moline is bequeathed to the widow, Vendla Maria Bergren. The will was drawn on Nov. 8, 1902.

LEGION PLANS MEMBER DRIVE

Local Post of American Legion to Start Drive for 500 New Members Next Week.

Rock Island post of American Legion has set a minimum of 500 new members as its goal in the national American Legion membership drive for 200,000 members which will be launched throughout the country May 9. Local Legion met also decided to get on the job early and start their campaign as soon as plans are perfected, which probably will be the latter part of next week. Charles R. Wheelan, Jr., has been appointed

chairman of the membership committee and details of the drive, arranged this week, will be announced to the members at the regular meeting Tuesday evening.

It is estimated that there are between 1,300 and 1,400 ex-service men in Rock Island, and as the total membership of the local American Legion post is only 400, more than a thousand ex-service men are eligible for membership. These are the men the Legion will endeavor to reach in their campaign. It will be done by a "thorough house-to-house canvass. For this work the city will be divided into districts. A captain will be placed in charge of each district, with a team of workers who will be expected to interview every ex-service man who is not already a Legion member and secure his membership if possible to do so.
