Program Tuesday.
The first undertaking of the membership of the Junior Community club is a program, to be offered to the public on next Tuesday evening at the high school auditorium. In keeping with its club aim the program will be divided into sections, each one given over to numbers peculiar to some nationality represented in this city. Bessie Rosenfeld is chairman of the program committee, and the first rehearsal is being held today.

Eligible to the club, as stated in the constitution, are any high school students who will signify their intention to cooperate in its efforts as stated, and any former student who has taken the vocational civics course and who is interested in the work of the club. At a recent meeting of the club Elizabeth Barbeau was chosen president for this semester. To Catherine McGlone, also one of the leaders in organizing the club, and her committee of two was given the work of drawing up the constitution and by-laws.
