

# Peoria Routed in Fifth Game With Rock Island

## ISLANDERS PERFORM IN STYLE AND LET PEORIA DOWN ON THE SHORT END OF A 9 TO 4 SCORE

### Dennis Is Master All the Way Through Although Touched Frequently.

The Islanders came through in excellent form yesterday, and copped another ball game from Peoria, this time 9 to 4. So that makes the series stand 3 to 2 in favor of Rock Island with one more game to be played before Peoria departs. So the worst Rock Island can get now is an even break with the Jackonites.

Good, bad and indifferent baseball was dished up for the entertainment of the assembled bugs. It was Peoria's turn to show poorly in the field, and they did. The four errors against the visitors gave the Islanders a few runs, but for the most part the markers were of the genuine earned variety.

Timely awaiting swelled the total to large proportions in the early rounds. Then Dennis let down a bit and allowed five hits in the last three innings. He twirled a cool, steady game, being master of ceremonies all the way through. He indicated his ability to tighten when things threatened, which was not often.

**Did Louie Run?**

The game produced its comedy for the fans. Perhaps the funniest situation occurred in the fourth inning, and Louie Kolls was the one to deliver. He opened the round by receiving a base on balls. Then Bueser elected to send Louie along on his journey by a sacrifice. The ball popped off the bat into the air. Louie thought Dennis might catch it. He raced back towards first. Dennis didn't catch it because he could get no where near it to do so. But he did scoop it up and toss it first to get Bueser. Louie got under full steam towards second. Smith pegged to Murphy. Murphy did not tag Kolls, but even though it was no force play, Fleming motioned Louie out. Kolls had run far off second before he could come to a stop and thinking he was out he started to brush the dust off his pants. Murphy quickly saw his mistake and made haste to touch Louie with the ball. Louie got hot and started for third with Murphy close behind. Louie just couldn't get the proper momentum in time and when he attempted to slide had first he stopped three feet short of the base. Murphy tagged him and went over the top. Then Louie crawled to the base and loudly protested that he had not been touched. But the funniest thing about it all was, Umpire Fleming would not change his first decision but ruled Louie was out at second base.

Then to stir things a bit more in the eighth, Jackson vociferously protested to Umpire Fleming against what he termed O'Neil's interference with Brown in an attempt to make a double play. Fleming got riled alright and just ordered Mr. Jackson to get off the field. Jackson went so slowly and continued to argue and tell the ump's what he thought of him that Mr. Fleming asked for an officer to take the bad man away. But Bill don't stay mad long. With his team far in the rear he smiled and sent Hanson to first base station. Then he went out among the bleachers and became one of the fans in that easy way of his.

Murphy had a perfect batting time at bat and one hit. Three other times he stepped to the plate only to be given four wide ones. The other time he got one of Gillenwater's curves in the back. And the best of it was he scored every time but the last one.

Elmer Benson shined at bat and to the field. He got two hits with men on bases. Added to that he

made seven putouts and had one assist with no errors. One of those putouts was made on a fly ball that Elmer had to race over to the right foul line to grab.

Jones cracked two screaming doubles, one out along the right foul line and the other to the center field fence.

Corwin, a catcher obtained by Peoria from St. Paul, appeared behind the bat for the first time, and to say he looks sweet is putting it mildly. He cracked out four clean hits, one a double, in five trips to his plate. And he caught a magnificent game of ball off a pair of twirlers inclined to be wild.
