


FINALLY WIN AMERICAN CUP

The Macoupin County Medical society at its May meeting passed a resolution asking all the health boards in the county to bar all school children not vaccinated by Sept. 1.

There has been an unusual number of communicable diseases reported for the past week: Douglas county, measles; 5; typhoid; 5; Naperville, whooping cough; 13; Zion City, smallpox; 10; New Boston, typhoid; 6; Viola, smallpox; 7; Rock Island, measles; 58; Freeport, scarlet fever; 14; Whiteside county, measles; 15.

ERROR CLAIMED FOR NEWBERRY

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 24.—A bill of exceptions and amendment of error filed for former Governor El Newberry and 11 others, convicted last March on charges of corruption in the 1916 campaign for election in federal court in Chicago, will go to the United States supreme court as soon as the hearing is completed, it was stated today.  
Assistant Attorney General Frank C. Dalley, who conducted the prosecution, has been working the bill of exceptions for several weeks. He said today he would endeavor to bring the case on hearing in the supreme court the earliest possible time.  
Senator Newberry was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in Leavenworth and fined \$10,000. All the convicted men have been at Leavenworth under bond pending perfection of the appeal.
