

### VIOLATOR VEHICLE LAW VIOLATORS STILL RAMPANT

Police Report Lists 196 Such Cases  
for July—Several Major Cases  
—Other Reports.

The Rock Island police department handled a total of 248 cases during the month of July, and the sum of \$1,400.55 was collected in fines and bond forfeitures by Magistrate D. J. Cleland. The report of Police Chief Tom Cox to the city commissioners shows a considerable increase in police activities for July over the month of June, when only 197 cases were handled and \$1,203.95 collected in fines.

As in June the July record also shows the most cases to have been violations of motor vehicle laws. Of the total number of cases handled in July 195 were of motor vehicle violations. There were 120 offenders arrested, one arrest for removing engine numbers, 42 arrests of drivers operating their cars with rear lights out, two arrests for careless driving, 13 arrests for operating cars at night with bright lights on and 17 arrests for automobiles being driven by street cars stopped to take on passengers.

Of the major cases handled one was of manslaughter. L. E. Benner was bound over to the grand jury in the killing of Arthur Fuller at a house boat at the foot of Third street. Benner claimed that the shooting was accidental.

Other major cases were five of larceny, one for assault with a deadly weapon, one of burglary and larceny, one of burglary, one of highway robbery and one of robbery. The detailed report follows:

### SCHAFER TO RUN FOR SHERIFF ON DEMOS' TICKET

Other Places on County Ticket Are  
Tentative, Subject to Approval  
of Nominee.

A tentative county ticket for the fall election was formulated by the Democratic county central committee in session last night at the Rock Island house.

Thomas J. Schafer, chief of police of East Moline, will make the race for sheriff. Mr. Schafer was present and agreed to accept the honor. A. L. Puiver of Moline, who was present also, was placed on the ticket for the office of county recorder. Names were presented for the other offices to be voted upon and a committee was selected to see the selectives and report back to the secretary. It was moved that the chairman and secretary be empowered to fill any vacancy in event those named decline to make the run.

Sentiment favored the placing of a full Democratic ticket in the field, not only in the county, but in the congressional and legislative districts as well. Andrew Olson, former mayor of Moline, was offered the opportunity of running for congress. After considerable discussion in which Mr. Olson spoke adversely to making the race, he took the matter under consideration.

The meeting expressed enthusiasm over the prospects of a complete Democratic victory this fall. All present pledged themselves to work unitedly for the success of the ticket.


