

**ALLEGED  
THIEVES READY  
TO GO TO WORK**

**Bowers and Claude Moses Had Tools on Them When Arrested in Room at Sherman Hotel.**

Andy Bowers and Claude Moses, two time citizens of Davenport, are being held at the Rock Island police station on charges of having been caught with burglar tools in their possession.

The men were arrested at 11 o'clock Thursday night in a raid on their room in the Sherman hotel, corner of Third avenue and Seventh street, by Detectives Dennis Bennett and Charles Ginnane and motorcycle officer Earl Shannon.

The men are said to have been taken just as they were preparing to leave the hotel ostensibly to pull a job.

In searching the men the police found three hack saws, a flash light, a pair of wire cutters, a .32 caliber revolver and a large bottle filled with morphine. The men also had a hypodermic syringe each. They are being held pending a further investigation and a probable hearing Saturday.

**Bowers Wanted in Davenport.**

The police said that Bowers is wanted in Davenport for a job pulled by him and his wife last winter. The two are said to have entered the Moss clothing store in Davenport and to have stolen articles of clothing. Bowers is about 25 years of age and Moses is about 25 years of age. Both are said to be well known to tri-city police.

Missing.**

Working upon the belief that the missing man lost his life in Rock river, squads of men are continuing to drag the river.

Fraternal orders to which Mr. Medcalf belonged have offered \$100 reward for the recovery of the body. Masons, Elks and Siboney post of Spanish War Veterans of which Medcalf was commander, are exerting every effort to learn the details of the disappearance and determine whether the man is yet alive or to substantiate the theory that he was drowned.


