Finds Wheel At Station.
Thursday morning David came into the station and reported that his wheel had been stolen. He described the bicycle and was told that he was in luck.

"Where do you live?" asked Desk Sergeant Arthur Kinsley.
"Quincy," answered David, and immediately drew considerable attention to himself.

"No, I am not from Quincy, I just rode in from Rio on my way to Chicago to get a job," the youth announced.

"You are moving around too fast, and I think we had better hold you for a while," said the desk sergeant. "What is your name?"

Gives False Name.
"Frank Smith," said David. "I live at 127 Walnut avenue, Galesburg."

The youth was detained and a call put in to the Galesburg police, who announced that the youth's mother had just left the station, after reporting his disappearance. The mother was nearly prostrated with grief.

Yesterday the youth's father came to take him back to Galesburg.

The father was greatly pleased over the locating of his son, who he said had no bad habits, but always wanted to work and had evidently left Galesburg for the reason that he seemed unable to find a good job.

EXPECT 4800 TO ENROLL OPENING SCHOOL MONDAY

Registration at High 700 During
Week—Other Buildings Ready
to Start.

Rock Island public schools will open Monday. E. C. Fisher, school superintendent, estimates that the enrollment for this September will surpass by over a hundred, last year's registration. Enrollment this term, Mr. Fisher believes, will reach the 4800 mark, while on the first day of registration a year ago, 4680 entered the public schools.

Seven hundred students enrolled in the Rock Island high school during the last week. Each class was given a day in which to enroll for the term's work, but 50 to 100 more are expected to enroll Monday. Upper classmen and all who have attended the high school before are asked to register Monday morning, while freshmen, new students and transfers are asked to enroll on Monday afternoon from 1:30 to 4 o'clock.

Registration Heavy.
Heavier registration is expected, Mr. Fisher says, due to the campaigns to keep children in schools, and to the legislation enforcing

minors to attend schools. By reason of choice, many are also re-enrolling their classes.

Freshmen day Thursday brought 250 first year pupils to the high school. Although the greatest percentage of the enrollments were those just entering the high school, some were second-half freshmen. Those who will register Monday are those who have been out of town or for some other reason failed to enroll on their proper day.

Many Subscribe for Paper.
Subscriptions for the Watch Tower, the bi-monthly paper of the high school, numbered 103 yesterday. Competition for obtaining the highest percentage of classmates taking the paper is becoming keen between the classes. The winner will be based upon the percentage and not the number of subscriptions taken out, as the freshmen class more than doubles any of the other classes. The seniors were recorded ahead yesterday. The number of subscriptions taken were, seniors 25, juniors 30, sophomores 13 and freshmen 35. The campaign will close on Wednesday, Sept. 8, and a party to the winners' class will be given on Friday, Sept. 17.
