RUBENNY ARMY IS ANNIHILATED

Warrior Reports Russian Bolsheviks Force Completely Wiped Out by the Poles.

Warsaw, Sept. 2.—(By the Associated Press).—The bolshevik army of General Budenny, noted cavalry leader, was annihilated during the operations in the Lublin sector, which began Aug. 29 and ended Sept. 1, says the Polish official statement on military operations issued today.

Isolated detachments of the Budenny's forces succeeded in occupying and are in disorderly retreat. General Budenny's command had been endeavoring to break through the Polish lines and march upon Lublin. They had nearly completed an encircling movement against Lublin, midway between Lublin and Lemberg, but were outflanked by the Poles and attacked from the east, the communication lines.

The bolsheviks lost heavily in killed and wounded, adds the statement, the Poles capturing thousands of prisoners, 16 guns and enormous quantities of material.
