

# SOUSA'S BAND COMES NOV. 12

John Philip Sousa, who has only recently been honorably discharged from the United States Navy in which he served as chief bandmaster throughout the war, has gathered his old world famous band about him once more and is undertaking the first coast-to-coast tour of the country he has made in many years. He will be seen at the Davenport College on Friday, Nov. 12. Sousa's band as the world knows it quit active service in September, 1917, when John Philip Sousa returned to his duties as lieutenant in the United States Naval Reserve force, thus abandoning his twenty-five year old organization, the most successful band in the history of the training of naval bandmen at the Great Lakes station. Lieutenant Sousa, in giving up his professional appearance and his overseas income, performed a fine and patriotic action which placed him on a par with all those other great heroes of the United States who made his personal and material sacrifices to serve Uncle Sam. But now Lieutenant Sousa, after a year and a half of devoted service, has been given his discharge, and his old well loved organization has again become active.

**FLAMING TORCH TOWERS HIGH**  
Bakersfield, Calif., Sept. 14.—A flaming torch was towering high toward the skies in the Elk Hills near here today as the result of friction resulting when Well No. 7, on the Curman lease, owned by the Standard Oil company, came in with a roar, forcing 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas through its casing. The friction caused a spark which ignited the gas.

**GOVERNMENT HOME OWNERS ARE PAID CITY TAX REBATE**  
The city commissioners Monday afternoon granted tax rebates to three government home owners amounting to \$644. One of the petitioners for tax rebate received \$12.88 while the other two received \$12.88 each. The money was refunded them as equal to the municipal and street and bridge tax, which had been paid the city by the United States Housing corporation by contract on the 216 homes in bulk and in a manner of payment in lieu of regular taxation. When the fight was on in the spring by the county as to whether or not the payment of taxes on government houses could be forced on assessments made by the assessor several of the purchasers of the government homes did not wait until the case should come to a final decision, but paid up their taxes in full.

**REPORT OF VISITING NURSE FOR AUGUST**  
The following is the report of the activities of the Visiting Nurse association during the month of August:  
"There were twenty-seven patients, twelve former and fifteen new. One hundred ninety-seven calls, one hundred eighty-one regular and sixteen extra.  
"The physicians were Drs. Salvoly, Paul, Williams, De Silva, Hall, Bradford, Friedman, Weiss and Mueller of Rock Island; Drs. Beck and Carlson, of Moline.  
"Nine patients were dismissed, three transferred to the care of the family, one to the hospital, one died and thirteen remaining.  
"There was one metropolitan patient, seven metropolitan calls, metropolitan collections \$3.50.  
"Fees collected, \$5.00; incidental expenses, \$1.00.  
"Articles loaned, three dozen maternity pads, five binders, one bed pad and one urinal.  
"Donations of supplies were made by Halpers' Circle of Kings' Daughters, Rock Island Chapter of Red Cross, City Steam Laundry, Parker's Laundry and Mrs. H. S. Cable.

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
