Commission Authorizes Transfer of Aurora Line—To Be Consummated Oct. 1.

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 29.—Authority was given the Aurora, Plainfield & Joliet railway today, by the state public utilities commission to sell its electric interurban line to the Aurora, Plainfield & Joliet Railroad company for \$757,000. The transfer will be consummated Oct. 1, the buying concern assumes all accounts payable and debts of the selling company.
