GALVESTON FIRE WIPES OUT PIERS

Blocks of Buildings and Steamships Burn—Cotton Sheds Destroyed

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 30.—Fire which started in the plant of the Texas Gulf Sulphur company at 2 a. m., took a toll of \$2,000,000 damage along the water front at the foot of Thirty-sixth street before it was controlled, it was estimated at noon today.

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 30.—Fire which broke out on the Galveston water front early today destroyed piers 35 and 36, and considerable adjacent property, damaged several steamers and consumed a large quantity of cotton and other commodities.
