

**Triced Recipes.**  
Toasted Cheese Sandwiches—Place thinly sliced cheese between sliced bread and brown on both sides in butter or butter substitute. This makes a very good and substantial luncheon dish.  
Chocolate Souffle—In a double boiler melt two tablespoons butter, add two tablespoons flour, stirring constantly and pour on gradually, three-quarters cup milk. Cook until mixture thickens, then add one-third cup sugar and three tablespoons cocoa mixed together. Lastly add the yolks of three eggs beaten until pale yellow. Cool, fold in the beaten whites of the eggs and bake 25 minutes in a buttered baking dish. Serve either hot or cold with cream. For a fancy dessert serve in dessert glasses, topping with whipped cream and a maraschino cherry. The above is sufficient for six people, but can easily be reduced by half or a third.  
Stuffed Tomato Salad—Scoop the center from medium sized, firm to-

matos, sprinkle with salt, oil, and place on lettuce leaf. Prepare the following mixture, which should be placed in the tomatoes before placing on the table:  
Filling: Take one tablespoon tate cheese to each tomato, mix with a little chopped onion, green pepper and add a few drops of lemon juice. Salt and paprika to taste.  
Corn a la Southern—Cut amount of corn desired from cob, then two eggs slightly beaten, one one-half tablespoons melted butter, one pint scalded milk, salt and pepper. Turn into buttered casserole and bake in a slow oven until firm. Left over corn on the cob may be used.  
Minute Steak Maryland—Three pieces of round steak cut thin, cut in pieces about the size of your hand and score deeply both sides with knife. Rub piece of steak with seasoned flour, rubbing it well. Fry in frying pan plenty of sweet lard until golden brown, turning occasionally. After you lift out, put in flour, let it scorch a little, then add water and milk and season to taste.  
Rose Salad—Use a medium sized tomato for each person, part, beginning at one opposite stem and cut partly down into the sections to stimulate petals of rose. Pass tomato on bloom end on a lettuce leaf; fill with very finely cut cucumber and celery; drop a teaspoon of dressing in the center.
