

INJURIES FROM AUTO ACCIDENT LEAD TO DEATH

Mrs. T. Effenbeck, Davenport, Fatally Hurt in Crash Two Weeks Ago, Succumbs.

Mrs. T. Effenbeck, 732 West Fifth street, aged 48, who for two weeks has lain at the threshold of death's door suffering the agonies of a crushed body sustained when she was struck by a touring car at Fifteenth avenue and Main street about 8:00 o'clock in the evening on Oct. 15, died at Mercy hospital Wednesday afternoon. Louis Shorey, aged 19, was driving the car which dashed out of the darkness of the street upon Mrs. Effenbeck and her small daughter as they were hurrying across the street.

The heavily loaded touring car narrowly missed the little girl, but her mother was not so fortunate. The front of the car struck the woman and she was carried to a point 20 feet north of the crossing, according to eye witnesses, before the car was brought to a stop.

Hurt Internally, A wheel passed over both of her legs, and besides other injuries, she sustained a broken ankle. She was also hurt internally and it is due to the latter hurts that her death resulted.

She failed to rally, however, and after lingering until last night, succumbed to the injuries.

Young Shorey was placed under arrest, but after questioning at the police station revealed that he was driving no faster than 18 miles an hour at the time of the crash, was released. Officials said that there was no evidence of careless driving.

NATIONAL DAY MEMORY VETS OF WORLD WAR

President Orders Flags Half-Masted On All Federal Property on Sunday, Nov. 14.

Custodian Harry P. Simpson of the Rock Island postoffice building, has received from the treasury department a copy of the following circular, which directs him to hoist the flag on the postoffice building at half mast on Sunday, Nov. 14, as a memorial to heroic American soldiers, sailors, marines and others who gave their lives to their country in the World war.

Washington, Oct. 20, 1920. To Heads of Bureaus, and Chief of Divisions, Secretary's Office, Treasury Department.

Gentlemen: The following executive order, issued by the president under date of Oct. 8, 1920, is quoted for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"I hereby direct that on Sunday, Nov. 14, 1920, the flag of the United States be displayed at half-mast at all military posts, naval stations, on vessels, and on buildings of the United States as a token of the nation's participation in the memorial services held for the heroic American soldiers, sailors, marines and others who gave their lives to their country in the World war."

WOULD REQUIRE CERTIFICATES FOR LIBRARIANS

Springfield, Ill.—Proposed legislation compelling every person accepting a position as librarian in Illinois to obtain a state certificate similar to that now required by teachers, has been drawn up by the legislative committee of the Illinois Librarians' association, and will be presented to the next legislature.

Price of the state library extension commission and chairman of the legislative committee, the proposed bill will prevent persons untrained for the duties of librarian from obtaining positions. At present there are no restrictions.

LABOR AGENCIES RELIEVE STATE FROM TENSION

Springfield, Ill.—Equalized distribution of industrial workers over the state through the efforts of state free employment agencies has done to relieve labor tension in Illinois, according to Barney Cohen, director of labor, Mr. Cohen said:
