**Thousand American Communities Received Aid During Year.**

here throughout the country. During the year the Red Cross organized its department of health service; extended its nursing service to meet a growing demand for public health nursing; taught its first aid to injured courses to thousands; and took the lead in the formation of the worldwide Red Cross societies, with headquarters in Geneva.

The department of health service, organized and at work during the last seven months of the year, was operating 123 health centers at the end of the year. From these radiated many activities designed to improve the health of a community and to prevent the spread of disease, while 435 Red Cross chapters also engaged actively in disease preventive work.

The health department also had 312 employees, serving at 52 public health hospitals, where 30,422 patients received some form of aid from the Red Cross. Fifteen hundred new members, of whom 503 were women, were added during the year to the life-saving service, a branch of the first aid to injured department, in which a complete

woman's corps also has been organized.

**Nursing Service.**  
For the nursing service the year was one of transition from military to civil activities. During the war 20,000 graduated nurses were assigned to war service which aided the return to civil life of several hundred. Sick nurses were cared for in a convalescent home, built during the year at a cost of \$16,000.

Enrollment in the nursing service increased from 26,426 to 36,705 during the year, and in an effort to increase the number of qualified public health nurses the national Red Cross and its individual chapters established approximately 600 scholarships at institutions over the country. Class instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick also increased threefold during the year, the attendance record being placed at 23,092. Two thousand nurses, acting as instructors, had charge of this work. The total expenses of the nursing service were \$129,968, a reduction of \$49,471 over the previous year.

Among the achievements of the

nursing department, was the adoption by 25 states of a uniform method of work in connection with the Red Cross, by which a bureau of public health nursing was instituted under the direction of a state health officer.

The work of the American society in the worldwide organization was described by the statement as "purely educational," serving to "blaze the trail for the league." Methods already worked out by the American society were adopted as the plan to be followed in all other countries.
