AT THE SPENCER.
Percy Marmont, the English actor, is Norma Talmadge's leading man in her latest First National picture, "The Branded Woman," which appears at Spencer Square tonight. Other members of the cast are well known lights of the cinema world, including Vincent Serrano, George Fawcett, Grace Studdiford, Gaston George Jean Armour, Edna Murphy, H. J. Carvill, Charles Lane, Sidney Herbert, Edouard Durand and Henrietta Floyd. The production is founded on Oliver D. Bailey's famous stage play, "Branded," having been adapted to the screen by Anita Loos and Albert Parker. It was directed by Albert Parker and photographed by J. Roy Hunt. Hugo Ballin was especially engaged to design some of the settings, which are considered among the most remarkable ever filmed.

AT THE MAJESTIC.

This Is Official Judge for Yourself

During a two-day session of the National Council of Furniture Associations, which was attended by the Executive Committee of the Retail Furniture Association of the United States

The Following Resolution Was Passed:—

Whereas, there have recently been established new and lower levels of price on a number of commodities, and

Whereas, it has been generally reported that the costs of manufacturing furniture have been materially reduced, and

Whereas, the Retail Merchants desirous of ascertaining facts, have requested the Executive Committee of the Retail Furniture Association of the United States to make a thorough and careful analysis of conditions governing the cost of furniture manufacturing today and to insist upon a lower level of price, if conditions are found to warrant it, and

Whereas, this investigation has been made in an extensive and thorough manner, and

Whereas, it has been determined that there have been no changes affecting the costs of furniture generally that would indicate that any material reduction could take place in the immediate future without affecting seriously the wages and steady employment of the men engaged in furniture manufacturing.

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Secretary be instructed to keep the members of this Council and the officers of the Retail Furniture Association of the United States informed of any changes in market conditions that affect the cost of manufacture, and

Furthermore, we deem it desirable and for the best interests of the Furniture Industry, as well as of the American home, that concerted effort be exercised by the manufacturers to reduce manufacturing costs other than labor, and to reflect these conditions in the finished product as soon as possible, and

Be It Further Resolved that to our best knowledge and belief, no general reductions in the price of furniture can possibly take place at this time and that the decline will be extremely gradual and can only come with parallel reductions in manufacturing costs.
