

WE ORDER IN FAVOR OF POLICE BILL

Representative Bill Locking From Majority of Members of the Public Forum.

These organizations comprising the public forum of the Chamber of Commerce, which have not yet given an expression on the question of a state police for Illinois have until Nov. 15 to make their sentiments known. The first meeting of the forum, which was held last night in the chamber rooms, resulted in five ballots being cast in favor of the bill. Delegates from the Rotary, Kiwanis, Knights of Columbus, Retail Merchants and American Legion voted for the bill as instructed by the referendum of their organizations. Those yet to be heard from include the Odd Fellows, Elks, American Association of Engineers, Rock Island County Medical Society, Rock Island real estate board, Rock Island Mutual Building and Loan association and the Rock Island Welfare association. The Elks representative was present last evening but declined to vote pending the reaction from the lodge.

The forum was addressed by Alpheus Stewart, representing the state police auxiliary committee on its workings of a state police organization. He cited figures on crime in Illinois, aiming to show the need of such a system for prevention of crime and apprehension of criminals.
