

STON CITED FOR BIRTH ON COMMISSION

Rock Island Baseball Man Held Likely Choice of Minor as Representative on New Board.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—Greatly around baseball circles today, after the opening of a joint conference of American and National League club owners, named "Mike" Sullivan of Rock Island, Ill., president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs, as the likely choice of the minors for the third representative on the baseball commission. Cal Ewing of the Pacific coast league, was also mentioned for the office.

Headed For Landis.
The 11 club owners who were signatories to the new Leaker plan for baseball reorganization, and who recently chose Judge K. M. Landis as head of the new tribunal to govern the proposed league, will stand out, a National League club owner said before the joint session convened.

He said, however, that they would not be averse to the selection of Judge Charles A. McDonald, who was instrumental in uncovering the baseball scandal, if Judge Landis did not accept the proffered position.

Verdict Today.
Clark Griffith, president of the Washington American league club, before going into the meeting, declared that, although difficulties were not yet settled, he was hopeful that before night all differences would be amicably adjusted.

PRESS CLAIMS ON STATE FOR ROAD'S ROUTE

Many Arguments Heard at Morning Session in Monmouth With Highway Commission.

Monmouth, Ill., Nov. 12.—The state highway commission was confronted here today with the problem of deciding what route between Rock Island and Monmouth shall come in for improvement out of state aid funds. Representatives from cities and towns all along the route met in the conference this morning at the court house. Arguments in support of claims for recognition of certain routes were advanced. J. F. Witter and C. J. Sparte declared Rock Island favors improvement of the Turkey Hollow route, claiming this follows the line of least resistance. C. W. Detweiler of Aledo spoke for a road leading south and west from Milan and south into Aledo. O. L. Clarke of Preemption asked for a road direct from Rock Island to Monmouth with a spur to serve Aledo. The conference was continued this afternoon.
