**Steak Bays Property**—Fred Black, head of W. G. Black & Co., and Joe Langford, manager of the Davenport branch of the Big National Bank, have purchased for \$11,000 the southwest corner of Fourth and Iowa streets. The seller was Nathan Stiglitz, a Polish immigrant, who came to this country several years ago and has since amassed a fortune, becoming an extensive holder of Davenport real estate.

**Field No Shot Accidentally**—After a 24-hour period of intermittent questioning in the police inquestorial chamber, Manuel Fortillo, Mexican accused of the shooting of John Sage, 17, negro, confessed that his was the finger which pulled the trigger of a revolver Sunday morn-

ing and a bullet was sent into the skull of the black, who is now at Mercy hospital, still in a semi-conscious condition.

He repeatedly asserted, however, that it was an accident, and that he didn't even know the negro boy, who he shot. The Mexicans said that he was drunk at the time, and that he was showing the gun to another member of his race, when it suddenly exploded. He couldn't remember where he had put the revolver.

**Business Man Held for Fraud**—Charged with fraudulently drawing a check which subsequently proved to be worthless, William E. Sailer, business man of Davenport and well known in the city, is being held in a police station cell after his ar-

rest yesterday on a warrant sworn out in the office of Justice of the Peace William Best. He denies the charge. He lives at 1214 Walnut court.
