WITH THE WOMEN OF TODAY

Miss Marie Spiridonova, noted woman revolutionary leader, and for years active in Russia against the czar's regime, is one of the leaders of the Russian peasant revolt against the regime of Trotsky and Lunin, according to recent cable dispatches. It seems that the peasants have proclaimed a new government.

It was but a few years ago that Miss Spiridonova was released from prison in Siberia. She was sentenced to death, but the sentence was changed to 30 years imprisonment for killing the chief of police of Tamber in 1904. While in jail it was reported she was terribly tortured by two police officers, who kicked her back and forth across the cell for 11 hours, tore her hair, and burned her flesh with lighted cigarettes. Both of her torturers were afterwards murdered. Miss Spiridonova is the daughter of a Russian general.

Woman Admitted to Bar in China.
Mrs. McCauley, wife of Lieutenant Commander Cleveland McCauley of the United States navy, now stationed in Chinese waters, has been admitted to practice law at Shanghai, China, according to a letter received by a friend of hers. She is the first woman to be admitted to the practice of law in the far east, it is thought.

Mrs. McCauley received her law degree at the University of Texas. She was graduated from there a few years ago. Her home was in San Antonio. Following her college days she went to Tampico, Mexico, where she taught in an American school. From there she went to Honolulu, where she continued her career as a teacher. It was in Honolulu she met Lieutenant Commander McCauley, who was stationed there with the vessels of the navy's Pacific fleet. After their marriage they went to Shanghai. How she broke down the barrier of prejudice there is not stated.

This Titled Woman Editor Has It Easy

Many women fill journalistic jobs in Europe, but Lady Diana Duff-Cooper (Diana Manners), the youngest daughter of the duke of Rutland, is in a class by herself. She accepted the editorship of the English edition of the French women's magazine, Femina, at what in newspaper circles is considered a fabulous sum. She contributes a short, chatty editorial about plays and the theatre and current events and allows her photograph to be freely used by the advertising department.

"Y" Girls Return From Poland.
Miss Martha Chickering of the national board of the Y. W. C. A. has arrived home after a year's work in Poland as head of the Polish Gray Samaritans. "Nothing finer was done overseas than the work of these 30 brave young Polish-American girls who went over with me Aug. 1, 1919, sent by the Y. W. C. A. to help Poland. They supervised the distribution of clothing and food during the winter to starving men, women and children," Miss Chickering said. "Over 350,000 suits of clothes went through their hands and they were responsible for food for 200,000 children daily. "Because means of communication were cut, these girls had to visit the communities to see that they were getting the proper supplies. I am not exaggerating when I say that in the first three months they visited every town and village in all Poland."
