

FACES COURT FOR FAILURE TO PAY WIFE

Claims Spouse Never Told Him of Her Divorce, But Continued to Accept Weekly Wages.

That his divorced wife lived in the same house with him from the time of receiving her decree during the May term of circuit court until some time in September without his knowledge that she had been divorced, is alleged by William Stiegel of Moline in his defense to charges of failure to pay alimony of \$40 per month.

Fact of the matter is, he claims, that his former wife continued to accept his weekly wages during the time she remained under the same roof after being divorced until she picked up and left the household. This amounted to \$30 per week. Stiegel told the court.

Stiegel was taken in custody yesterday afternoon at his work in Moline and arraigned before Judge E. C. Graves to answer the charges of his former wife that he had failed to pay the alimony decreed by

court. Stiegel being of a temperamental nature, bared his side of the case in no uncertain terms. He admitted having had knowledge of his wife filing a petition for divorce, but denied that he had ever been made acquainted with the fact that the same had been granted. He says his first information as to the true state of affairs came soon after his wife—that was had left the house when she called at his place of employment and demanded all money payment out of his wages. Stiegel refused and has since steadfastly stuck by his principles.

There are five children by the marriage. Having a desire to learn more details from neutral sources, the judge remanded Stiegel to jail this afternoon, when the children will be brought before the court to testify.
