FARMERS TALK OF MARKETING

Conference at St. Louis Discusses Proposed Legislation for Extension of Credits.

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 17.—Credits and systematized marketing were considered today at the conference of farmers in progress here.

Delegates urged that the conference sponsor legislation for enlarging the powers of the federal reserve board, to allow the extending of personal loans or short time credits to assist the farmers.

It was stated also that the suspension of the federal farm loan act, on account of the suit to test its constitutionality, had hampered the farming industry.

THREE MURDERS PUZZLE POLICE

Unsolved Mysterics Confront New York Department—Officer Mortally Wounded.

New York, Dec. 17.—Three more unsolved murder mysteries—one involving the theft of \$100,000 in jewelry and one the slaying of a police lieutenant—were chalked up today against a police department smarting under newspaper attacks for alleged inefficiency.

Most spectacular of the new crimes was the holdup and murder in the heart of the Fifth avenue shopping district of Edwin W. Andrews, wholesale jeweler.

Washington, Dec. 17.—To deal with the situation arising from the refusal of the Western Union Telegraph company to accept from members of congress messages to be charged to government account, Representative Ireland of Illinois, chairman of the house accounts committee, has introduced a bill to authorize local postmasters to pay bills presented by managers of telegraph companies for messages accepted from government officials.

LOSSES BY STRIKES

Madrid, Dec. 16.—Losses resulting from strikes during the past month in Saragossa aggregate more than six million pesetas, according to the newspaper Accion. Similar conditions prevail in Barcelona, Valencia, Seville and Madrid.

CORPORATIONS CHECK HEAVILY

Traverse Rejection Makes Public Important Financial Data Showing Government Expenses.

Washington, Dec. 17.—More than \$12,128,000,000 has been paid out by the treasurer of the United States up to Oct. 31, on checks drawn by the six government corporations and the railroad administration against their accounts on deposit with the treasury, according to a report by Secretary Houston.

Sanbor corporation had checked out \$2,977,944,887 and had a balance of \$271,899,580; the United States Housing corporation, withdrew \$135,282,053 and had a balance of \$2,959,446; the federal land bank withdrawals amounted to \$15,312,261, and their balance \$1,253,826; and the railroad administration checked out \$1,811,786,554, and had a balance of \$25,774,524.
