

### PLAN TO WIDEN BUSINESS ZONE

East Moline Council Makes Room For Growing City; Free Water List Is Eliminated.

(Special Moline Service.) Construction of business buildings on Seventeenth street between Eleventh and Eighteenth avenues and on Eleventh avenue between Thirteenth and Seventeenth streets will be permitted by the city of East Moline, provided persons desiring to erect such buildings obtain the consent of the property owners as stipulated in the building ordinance. Alderman McClave last evening called attention of the council to the fact that there are a number of business men who are contemplating putting up store buildings in this district, but are hindered by building restrictions. Several of the other councilmen pointed out that the residents of that district would welcome the convenience that the stores nearby would afford. This section is said to be within the fire zone, but should any part of it be outside, the city can, under terms of the zoning law, have such part included in the limits, it was explained by the city attorney.

The council last evening voted to dispense entirely with the free water list. An ordinance which has been in force for some time provides that water be furnished free of charge to widows who depend entirely on washing clothes for a living. Many women have taken advantage of this generosity, and, it is said, that only one of those on the free list could qualify under the terms of the ordinance. This ordinance will be repealed, and in the event there are needy widows whom the councilmen feel are entitled to free water, requests of the women will be granted.

Mayor G. P. Johnson blocked the passage of a resolution to borrow \$15,000 from the three banks of East Moline, and upon his suggestion the council voted to use \$17,000, which is to be transferred from the special fund to the general fund, in retiring notes of \$15,000 now held by the banks, and paying the current bills. The \$17,000 will come within several hundred dollars of taking care of both items.

Commenting on this procedure, the mayor said that he could not see the wisdom of paying the banks 6 or 7 percent on borrowed money when the city has funds available to pay the banks and take care of its current expenses.

The plat of Glendale addition, revised according to recommendations of the city engineer, was formally accepted. The tract is south of St. Mary's cemetery, west of Third street, and is owned by Lawrence Greer.

Alderman J. R. Newton, chairman of the finance committee, announced that the annual budget would be made up at a meeting of the committee Friday evening and he asked that all department heads submit their budgets before that time.

### BOGUS MASONS UNDER ARREST

Secretary of the Association Taken in Custody for Misuse of Mails—One Official Jailed.

Developments in the case against the grand lodge officers of the American Masonic Federation, an alleged clandestine fraternal association, aired recently in the United States district court in Salt Lake City, with Judge Martin J. Wade of Davenport on the bench, have taken a new turn with the arrest of William C. Mason, acting grand secretary general, on the charge that he used the mails wrongfully in securing a \$10 subscription to the Universal Free Mason, a publication issued at Portland, Ore.

Matthew McBaine Thompson, grand president; Dominic Bergera, grand treasurer; and Thomas Perrot, a former grand secretary general, have already been convicted by a jury on the charge of using the mails to defraud.

Thompson and Bergera are at liberty under bond, and Perrot has been taken to the Fort Leavenworth prison to begin a two years' sentence.

M. G. Price, a postoffice inspector at Salt Lake City, has recommended to the postmaster general that a fraud order be issued against mail addressed to the men under arrest and to the nine Masonic bodies alleged to be fraudulent.

This would affect the following organizations: The American Masonic federation, the Grand Lodge

Inter-Montana, the Confederated Supreme council, the International Masonic federation, the International Masonic Federation of Colorado Masons, the Supreme Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons Scottish Rite, the Grand Council of Rites and the National Symbolic Grand Lodge of Scotland. The order will likewise apply to the use of the mails by any and all branches and sub-divisions of these organizations.

Regular Masonic bodies throughout the country have ranked the orders conferred by the federation and affiliated societies as clandestine.
