The Corn Crop in Illinois.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 15.—Following is summary of the reports of the corn crop of the state made to the state board of agriculture Dec. 1: Area planted is 1,231,051 acres larger than in 1892. The northern division planted 2,512,835 acres; central division, 2,624,430; southern division, 949,254. Notwithstanding the adverse circumstances of the past season the average yield per acre is 26 bushels, making a total yield of nearly 32,500,000 bushels larger than in 1892. The total corn crop of the state for 1893 was 169,916,311 bushels.




