WRIGHT DEFENDS HIS BILL.

It Is Not Computsory Arbitration and Some Editors Are Lying.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Newspaper'discussion of the arbitration bill introduced in the house as one result of the investigation of the strike commissioners has given rise to certain impressions which Commissioner Wright has thought best very persistent in their attempt to convince people that the arbitration bill drawn by Mr. Kernan and myself at the request of your committee provides for compulsory arbitration. The result of this deception is that several labor organizations and others interested in the passage of the measure are opposing, when if they knew the facts in the case they would not take such action. The bill does not provide in any sense for compulsory arbitration.
