MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Official Proceedings of Last Night's City Council Meeting.

CITY COUNCIL ROOM, ROCK ISLAND, Sept. 23.—The council met pursuant to adjournment at 8 p. m., Mayor Knox presiding, and all the aldermen present. Checks of unaccounted bidders on the Sixth ward sewer system were ordered returned, on motion of Ald. Dauber. Ald. Foss moved that the question of repairing washed out sidewalks be referred to the street and alley committee and city attorney, to report at the next meeting. Carried.

Ald. Schroeder reported a conversation with E. Rutledge, of the Rockford Construction company, who said that before talking about a proposition from the company, the city should make a formal demand under its bonds. He therefore moved that when the council adjourns it be till 2 p. m. Thursday to inspect the streets, and decide what is wanted. Carried.

Ald. Maucker moved that a committee of three be appointed, in connection with the mayor, to ascertain if Twelfth street may be legally placed in passable condition, with power to act. Carried, and the mayor appointed Aids. Maucker, Nelson and Johnson as such committee.

Ald. Kennedy, from the claims committee, reported adversely on the claim of H. L. Wheelan for pay for earth excavation. Report not adopted, 6 to 7.

Ald. Schroeder, from the fire and light committee, reported having let the contract to erect a chimney at the Central hose house to Stroehle, Crowley & Co., their bid being the lowest. Report adopted by unanimous vote.

Ald. Foss reported that the special committee had decided in favor of Twenty-fourth street as the line of the storm drain, and as to other details asked further time, which was granted.

Ald. Foss, from the special committee, reported in favor of authorizing a contract with Davis & Co. for the laying of specified water mains, to be paid out of next year's appropriation, the cost approximating \$4,000, including contracts made. Report adopted 13 to 1 (Zeis).

Ald. Schroeder offered a resolution calling for financial reports for the year ending April 15, 1894 and 1895, of receipts to Sept. 1, 1895, and for semi-annual reports hereafter. Carried, 9 to 5.

J. H. Wilson was given the floor on motion of Ald. Kennedy, and explained how the water comes down Twenty-seventh street in time of storms—diverted from its natural course on Twenty-eighth street—and suggested changes. Referred to the street and alley committee.

Ald. Dauber submitted a petition from property-holders of Nineteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, asking that they be allowed to place curbstones on the street at their own expense, and under the direction of the street and alley committee. Referred to the street and alley committee to report next Thursday.

Ald. Kennedy offered a resolution that the mayor appoint a committee of three aldermen, who together with the city marshal, shall investigate the alleged action of a saloonkeeper in playing dice with a boy and gaining his month's wages. Ald. Maucker moved as a substitute that the resolution be laid on the table. The substitute was lost, 6 to 8, and the resolution adopted by unanimous vote. The mayor appointed as such committee Aids. Kennedy, Dauber and Surman.

Ald. Schneider offered a resolution to pay the property holders of Thirtieth street their rebate, less \$178, to cover Mr. Wheelan's claim. Ald. Maucker moved as a substitute that Contractor Wheelan be paid \$15 in full of his claim and that the residue be refunded to the property holders. Carried.

Ayes—Surman, Zeis, Maucker, Dauber, Tindall, Schneider, Foss, Pender—8.

Noes—Johnson, Schreiner, Schroeder, Kennedy, Gall, Nelson—6.

The clerk read a communication from O. J. King, contractor of the federal building, stating that in his opinion the government would not allow him the proposed charge for a sewer connection. Received and placed on file, on motion of Ald. Johnson.

Ald. Schroeder moved that the fire and light committee be instructed to examine the condition of alleys and outbuildings between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets and First and Second avenues. Carried.

The clerk read petitions from Blake & Burke and Baker, McNeill & Sessler for leave to open paved streets. Granted.

The clerk read a remonstrance of property holders against the proposed storm drain on Twenty-fourth street. Referred to the special committee on storm drain.

Ald. Maucker moved that every alderman report next Thursday lists of sidewalks that they have filled to adjourned. Carried.

Adjourned till 2 p. m. Thursday on motion of Ald. Tindall.
