MONEY LOANED ON POOR SECURITY.

Disastrous End of Thirty-Six Years' Faithfal Service-Ilis Honor Not Impogned, but His Brain Believed To Be Worn Out -Chicago Man Gets the Big End of the Cash-Erring Cashier Required to Resign His Position at Oper.

New York, Feb. 2. - After loaning \$295,000 of the bank's money without consulting the directors Cashier Willlam J. Quinlan, Jr., has resigned his position in the Chemical National bank of this city, by request and President Wikiams says: "We have charged off nearly the whole of the loans to our on the stock exchange during the panic, profit and loss account, although we so that he has nothing with which to are satisfied that we shall recover a farre part of the money eventually." The president added that the bank was entirely sound and that creditors need feel no starm. "In my opiniou," said been made the victim of clever schemers. One of the men who has borrewed money from Quinlan is Francis Grafile, of Chleago; another is John S. Silver.

Men Who Borrowed the Cash

Referring to these men Williams said: "Mr. Quinlan had known Mr. Grable for some time, and six weeks ago, when the latter asked for a loan of \$5,000 to help along some scheme of his, Mr. Quinlan gave it to him. Then came another loan of \$5,000 which was also granted. Next Silver was brodght into the deal."

"What is Silver's business?" Presilent Williams was asked.

"Chiefly to get money out of banks," vas the terse raply. "Quinian was induced to make the first foat, believing the security to be all right. 
