SOLDIERS' SAVINGS.

Members of Company A Remember Dependent Ones at Home.

PRIVATE MOORE IS NOT FOR SELF.

Pool of Earnings From Uncle Sam to be Sent Back to Rock Island—Boys in the Guard House—Distinguished Visitors for the 6th Regiment—Congressman Prince Dines With Col. Foster.

According to a Washington special, the members of the 6th regiment at Camp Alger are discussing the question of what best to send home a portion of what they have received and how to spend to best advantage the remainder. It is safe to estimate that nearly 75 per cent of the money which Paymaster Hammond distributed in Col. Jack Foster's command will go to the wives and families in Illinois. Many of the men are clubbing together and putting all of their savings into a pool which is sent on to the local bank, and may there be drawn upon in accordance to the deposit. Capt. McCoochie, of Company A, raised about \$200 in his company for such a fund. Of this amount Private Steve Moore contributed \$18, retaining just 20 cents of his month's wages for expenditure upon himself.

Companies A and E of the 6th have formed company messes, to which each man contributes a small amount of his pay monthly. The officers of the 6th are protesting quietly over the amount of their mess bills. Last month these amounted to about \$28 for each man. As table board at excellent hotels in Washington costs little more than this, the officers think it is too high for camp fare.

The 6th had distinguished visitors yesterday in the person of Miss Clara Barton, Mrs. George Kennan, wife of the Siberian traveler; Dr. George Habbell and Dr. Gill, members of Miss Barton's staff. They visited the division hospitals, and then those of the 6th Illinois, 8th Ohio and 6th Massachusetts. Congressman George W. Prince and family dined with Col. Foster, of the 6th, yesterday.

Boys in the Guard House.

A dispatch from Camp Alger states that the guard houses of the 6th and 7th regiments are full of prisoners who failed to return from Washington in the required time Sunday. A great many of the men were allowed to go to Washington yesterday, and a number overstayed their leave and tried to force their way past the guard lines last night. They were stopped and finally arrested, and as a consequence of their forcible attempt, ball cartridges have been served the guards. Forty-two men were captured, of whom eight were from the 6th and five from the 7th.

Lieut. Col. Ed Kittelsen of the 6th, discovered a game of poker in progress and immediately caused the tent to be raided. The men, however, were permitted to go unpunished after a severe reprimand, and with the notification that any further gambling means disgrace and the most severe punishment. As a matter of course none of the transgressors in any of these instances is from Company A.

The 6th had no church or other religious services yesterday, but Chaplain Morgan held a prayer meeting in the evening. The 6th has no shade anywhere near its camp, and it would have been cruel to ask the men to sit in the hot sun in the morning hours.

CHILDREN'S DAY DOINGS.

Flowers and Interesting Exercises in the Protestant Churches.

Yesterday was children's day in the various churches of the Protestant denomination in the city, and the occasion was attended by beautiful floral displays and impressive services in which the little people took part.

The decorations at the First Baptist church for children's day were elaborate and beautiful. An arch spanned the rostrum. This was wrapped in red, white and blue, the national colors being artistically and tastefully presented. The floral display was profuse. The exercises by the young folks were greatly enjoyed. In the evening a young men's service was held and addresses were given by three young men. O. L. Benway spoke on "How are We Spending Our Years?" E. B. McKown on "The Young Man Living for Christ in Social and Business Life," and Guy B. Hanks on "Some Practical Suggestions." A male quartet consisting of Messrs. Boydston, Karr, Williams and Taylor rendered some beautiful songs. The service was one of deep interest.

Immanuel Baptist chapel was crowded to overflowing last evening for the observance of children's day. A program of superior excellence was given, the little folks doing themselves proud. Too much credit cannot be given to those who arranged and prepared the exercises. The singing was particularly good by the school, and by a quartet, and a solo, "Cling To the Bible, My Boy," by C. G. Taylor. The exercises closed with a brief address by Mr. Taylor, who took for his text: "A Rose." The decorations were very fine.

At Memorial Christian, the children sang, Rev. Gratton made an address, and Mrs. Bradley rendered a vocal solo.

At the First Methodist, there were short speeches, including one by Rev. McCulloch, and singing.

At the Broadway Presbyterian, a program of music and recitations was carried out by the children of the Sunday school, after which Rev. W. S. Marquis made an address.

At the Central Presbyterian, the children made brief speeches, sang songs assisted by the congregation, and listened to an address by Rev. W. I. Allen.

The Storm Drain Settlement.

At tonight's council meeting it is understood a plan is to be proposed for the adjustment of the storm drain case, which has been before the council and council committees for some months, following the conviction in the circuit court of the contractors and associates of conspiracy. It will be remembered that Contractor Schnell some months ago made a proposition to the council to settle the matter on a basis satisfactory to the city. And it is on the strength of the committee's report after investigation that action is anticipated. The city may be expected to guard the interests of the taxpayers fully in any proceedings that may be had.

This is a matter, it is hardly necessary to state, that should not be too hastily acted upon, and Mayor Medill stated this morning that, realizing this, it might not come up tonight, and still it might. The mayor rightly feels that only such a plan as looks to the city's interests and the disposition of the matter with the least expense and annoyance should be considered.

One cited the case of an artist who is afflicted with palsy so badly that he cannot convey his food or drink to his mouth unaided. And yet this man with pallet and brush in hand can paint as well as ever he could. Smith comes to Kansas City frequently, and when here likes to go to a shooting gallery on Walnut street and shoot at the targets. He is a good shot and enjoys looking along a rifle barrel. Smith has the palsy in an alarming degree. When he raises the rifle and aims it at the target, it jerks around in such a lively manner that one would wager he could not hit the side of a house, but just as he is about to pull the trigger his hand steadies and the next instant the bell rings.—Kansas City Star.

WANTS ANOTHER WING

Davenport Proposes the Establishment of an Additional Central Body.

BEFORE TRI-CITY LABOR CONGRESS.

Trouble Between the Rock Island Brewery Workmen and Their Employers—An Effort Made to Effect a Settlement—An Organizer Chosen—As to Candidates for School Directors.

The monthly meeting of the Tri-City Labor Congress at the Industrial Home yesterday afternoon brought out a large attendance of delegates. Louis Johns presided in the absence of the president.

An important proposition presented and finally tabled for further orders was contained in a communication from the Workmen's Industrial Home association of Davenport, asking that a central labor body, a wing of the congress, be established on that side of the river, and that the meetings be held alternately in Rock Island and Davenport.

The discovery of another bogus label on cigars manufactured by Strassburger & Co., was reported, and a committee appointed to investigate these violations, was continued. It was ordered that the committee delegated to ascertain where the union clothing label was carried continue its work, and that it be assisted by the cigar label committee, and such others of the congress as its members may call upon.

The brewery workmen of Rock Island are in a little wrangle with their employers over the scale for the ensuing year, and have appealed to the congress. A committee was appointed to act with the executive committee and make an effort to bring about a settlement of the differences.

Organizer Elected.

J. E. Larkin was chosen organizer for the congress for Rock Island. Complaint having been made that unfair book supply houses were receiving orders in the three cities, a committee of three for each city was designated to inquire into the class of supplies used by the boards of education.

The levying of an assessment to pay the expenses of the Gompers meeting was reconsidered. The congress was informed that the Falcon bicycle carried the union label.

The legislative committee was instructed to use all honorable means to secure the nomination of men favorable to union labor for the coming school election in Rock Island. A meeting is to be held at Turner hall next Friday night for the purpose of considering and endorsing candidates.
