GOES WITH ANOTHER.

August De Lerifler Makes Serious Allegations Against His Wife.

HE BEGINS SUIT FOR A DIVORCE.

Declares His Better Half is Now Living With Victor De Mister at Logansport, Ind.—May Marshall and Henry C. McMillin Also Institute Proceedings—County Court Matters.

August De Lerifler, in a suit for divorce begun in the circuit court, alleges that his wife ran away with another, Victor De Mister, by name, and is now living with him at Logansport, Ind. De Lerifler says he married Caroline De Mink at St. Louis, Sept. 6, 1893. In June, 1897, while residing in Rock Island, she became intimate with De Mister, so the complainant charges, and after her infidelity had been discovered by her husband, she fled with him. De Lerifler, who now lives in Moline, also asks the custody of his child, August. He is represented by Meese & Allen, who have also instituted proceedings in behalf of May Marshall, of Moline, who alleges desertion. She states she was married to Robert Marshall Dec. 13, 1890. She has two children.

Henry C. McMillin, of Rock Island, through his attorney, S. R. Kenworthy, has instituted proceedings for divorce against his wife, Ella, to whom he was married at Sioux City, Iowa, Aug. 27, 1893. He charges that he was compelled to leave her last July on account of her cruel treatment of him.

That the test will successfully demonstrate the usefulness of the elevated light is not in the hope of those who favor the combination system.



A Sailor Missing.

Harry Swisher, a Moline Naval Reserve, has been missing since the evening of Nov. 1. Since his return from the service he has not been of cheerful disposition that was characteristic of him before the war. He spoke several times of going to Chicago in search of employment. His photograph has been sent to the authorities at that place in the hope of locating him. While serving on the Lancaster at Key West, Swisher suffered "double irons" for five days for refusing to obey an officer, and was kept guard over by a marine during that time in a dark hole in the second deck below.
