## BODY TO REST HERE.

Sanford G. Powell to Be Buried at Rock Island Arsenal.

## HIS DEATH IN A CUBAN HOSPITAL.

Succumbs to Malaria and Homesickness After Surviving the Battle and Siege of Santiago—Arrangement for the Funeral, Which Will Be a Military One—His Career.

Among the bodies that were brought from Cuba and Porto Rico on the transport Crooke a few days ago, was that of Sanford Grosvenor Powell, a lad who spent the last six years of his life in the three cities. The remains have been ordered shipped here by the government at the request of the boy's mother, who is now in the

south with her other son who has just recently succumbed in getting discharged from the army.

The body will be laid to rest with the honored dead in the national cemetery at Rock Island arsenal. Arrangements have been made for a military funeral. The body was shipped today from New York by express, and is expected to reach Rock Island some time tomorrow. E. F. Shalek, of this city, a brother-in-law of the deceased, is arranging for the funeral.

Service in the Sixteenth. Sanford Grosvenor Powell was born in Guelph, Ont., July 18, 1878. He was a devoted son, attached to his home, but like the thousands of other boys who were anxious to do and die for their country, did not realize the hardships which he would necessarily have to encounter. He served with Company B, 16th U. S. Infantry, surviving the battle and siege of Santiago, only to succumb to physical exhaustion, in which condition he was attacked by malaria, from which he passed away in a Cuban hospital, August 14, 1898, the end being hastened by a longing to see home again.

The funeral will be held at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the First

## MARCH A WINTER MONTH.

Cold, Cloudy and Wet. With Practically No Farm Work Done.

March has proven to be a winter month, cold, cloudy and wet, with practically no farm work done at the end of the month. Frost remains in the ground over the entire north half of the state and runs from 2 to 4 feet over the northern district. In the extreme south a few have sown oats, made small gardens and planted a few potatoes. Little breaking has been done, but generally the soil is too wet to admit of work, and the season is from two to three weeks behind.

In his report to the agricultural department concerning live stock in Rock Island county, Crop Correspondent Thomas Campbell states that the health of horses, cattle and sheep has been good during the year, and that only about twenty head of hogs have died, mostly from cholera.

## Lies About Chairman Maucker.

Not content with indulging in perversion and slander of the candidates on the democratic ticket, the Union has gone out of its way to cast falsehoods and slurs at Chairman Maucker, of the democratic city-township committee. A number of absolutely false accusations have been made concerning his manner of conducting the campaign, of which the Second ward speech attributed to him is a sample. The Anniversary of the Rising of Our Savior From the Dead.

## ENDING OF THE LENTEN SEASON.
