TO DECIDE TONIGHT, DEATH OF MRS. C. E. KYTE. SWIMS TO HIS DEATH

J. B. Leu, Electrical Engineer at the Crescent Bridge, is Drowned.

CARRIED AWAY BY THE CURRENT.

Reaches a Point Two Hundred Feet Below the Draw, and Rescue Party Hastens to His Assistance, But is Too Late-Undertakes a Hazardous Task.

J. B. Leu, electrical engineer at the Crescent bridge, was drowned yesterlay afternoon at 4 o'clock while attempting to swim from the north pier to the draw, which was open, a dis-tance of about one hundred and sixty feet, as stated in last night's Argus.

Mr. Leu, in company with Michael . Walsh, foreman of the small crew of men who are completing the minor details of the bridge, left the draw pier at about half-past 8 in a boat, which was rowed by Charles Rinboldt, who took them to the first pler and returned to the draw, both men having business in Davenport, H. D. Mack and family are home from their northern outing.

On reaching the opening he removed his reaching the opening he removed his clothing and climbed down the ladder, with the intention of swimming across instead of calling the boat, as is cus-

tomary. The current is extremely sw ft at this point, and it is a hazardous task for the most expert swimmer to reach the draw before being carried down the river. The supposition is by the workmen who were at work on th south side of the bridge, and could not see the unfortunate man, that the current was carrying him along at such a rate, or he exhausted his strength in attempting to reach his destination, that he was unable to recover himself sufficiently to call for help until he was lost almost two hundred feet below the draw.
