Postal Frauds. The allegations of fraud in the Washington city postoffice are thus summarized:

A confidential report showed that irregular disbursements for the year ending June 30, 1899, amounted to from \$50,000 to \$100,000. During that period the Porto Rican postal service was included with that of Washington city. Many of the extravagances occurred in Porto Rico.

Through political influence from 50 to 75 benchmen enjoyed luxurious junkets at the public expense. Some of the postoffice officials traveled upon private business at the government's expense. Many of the vouchers were pushed through the auditing department only with the utmost difficulty.

For more than a year six women cleaners were carried on the rolls at \$500 each and performed no service. Letter carriers were detailed to examine the claims of their associates for overtime and drew salaries at both places.

Funds were paid for double and even triple salaries in very ingenious ways.
