Guadalupe was a village of 300 people, and these depended solely on their crops and domestic animals for subsistence.

MUSSELMANS PERPETRATE FRIGHTFUL MASSACRE AND BURN AND DESTROY EIGHT VILLAGES.

Paris, Oct. 20.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that a new and frightful massacre of Armenians has just occurred in the district of Diarbekir. The Musselmans, it is asserted, pillaged, outraged and killed during five days without intervention by Turkish troops. Eight villages, it is added, were entirely destroyed and burned.
