SHUTS OUT DIVORCEES

Canon Proposed by a Committee of the Episcopal Church is Radical.

RAPID-FIRE MARITAL CHANGES

Will Not Be Possible in That Communion if the General Convention Consents.

New York, Nov. 15.—When the general conference of the Protestant Episcopal church meets in San Francisco next October three new canons on the subject of marriage and divorce will be placed before the body for its consideration. Should these canons become the law of the Episcopal church through the approval of the general conference, then the Episcopal church will have pronounced its anathema against divorce and more particularly against the remarriage of divorced persons, while both parties to the divorce are still in life.

The first canon adopted is entitled "Holy matrimony and impediments thereto." The second section of this canon defines the impediments of consanguinity and affinity as stated in the books of Leviticus and Deuteronomy.

The second canon is the one that deals with divorce, and after declaring that "No minister shall solemnize marriage without the presence of witnesses, nor without witnesses to whom the parties are personally known except in a case in which it is impossible to such witnesses to be secured," and that "No minister shall solemnize the marriage of any person not identified to his satisfaction," it goes on to say that "No minister shall solemnize marriage between any two persons unless, nor until, by inquiry he shall have satisfied himself that neither person has been or is the husband or the wife of any other person living, unless the former marriage was annulled by decree of some court of competent jurisdiction for cause existing before such former marriage."

THIRD CANON GOES THE LIMIT.

Shuts Out the Offender from the Church. The above canon forbids the remarriage of either party to a divorce, whether guilty or not. The third canon goes one step further and excludes from all means of grace within the dispensation of the church any divorced person who shall have remarried and be living with husband or wife, as the case may be, while the other party to the divorce still is in life.

The canon is subdivided into three sections. Section 1 says: "No person divorced for causes arising after marriage, and marrying again during the lifetime of the other party to the divorce, shall be admitted to baptism, or confirmation, or received to holy communion, except when penitent and separated from the other party by the subsequent marriage, or when penitent and in immediate danger of death; but this canon shall not apply to the innocent party in a divorce for the cause of adultery." Section 3 provides for appeal to the bishop of the diocese or missionary district who, if he deems the cause sufficient, may take counsel with two neighboring bishops and decide whether there shall be any dispensation.

The canons in this form were unanimously adopted by the taking part in the conference, who were: Rev. Dr. Morgan Dix, rector of Trinity parish; Rev. Dr. Hoffman, of New York; Rev. Dr. Mann, of St. Louis; Rev. Dr. Fulton, of Philadelphia; and Rev. Dr. E. C. Riddle, of Baltimore. Lay members—Francis A. Lewis, of Philadelphia; Francis L. Stetson, of New York; Chas. H. Stanley, of Washington, and Judge E. G. Bradford, of Wilmington, Del.

RAPID CHANGE EDUCATION. Sudden Turnovers in the Management of a Military School.

Kearney, Neb., Nov. 15.—Disagreement between the principal, Dr. E. H. Chittenden, and Professor Russell, chief instructor of the Kearney Military academy, yesterday resulted in Russell handing in his resignation and leaving the school instantaneously. The other teachers and the boys to the number of about forty, believing that Professor Russell had not been fairly dealt with, quit the academy in a body. The boys, who are nearly all non-residents of Kearney, had nowhere to go, and Russell secured lodgings for them at a hotel and then began arrangements to open a school of his own.

The Kearney Military academy is under the management or supervision of the Episcopal church, and as soon as Bishop Graves learned of the trouble at the school he immediately took steps to have the matter adjusted with the result that Dr. Chittenden resigned the management of the school and Professor Russell was put in charge. He immediately abandoned the idea of opening another school, and accompanied by the boys and teachers who had deserted, went back to the academy.

LATEST IN TELEPHONES. Here's a Man That Uses the Ohio River for a Wire.

Louisville, Nov. 15.—The Courier Journal says: "Captain Lorcher, standing under ten feet of water in the Ohio river at Evansville, Ind., talked to a reporter in The Courier Journal office last night over the long-distance telephone. He used his own submarine telephone, which operated under a pressure of about four pounds to the square inch."

New Rate of Fiddlers' Pay. Youngstown, O., Nov. 15.—The committee on bi-monthly settlement of the amalgamated scale, which is based on the selling price of bar iron for the preceding two months, met here yesterday afternoon and decided that the price for boiler iron for November and December should be \$4.75 per ton instead of \$5, the price paid during September and October.

"Jag-Cure" Law is Invalid. St. Paul, Nov. 15.—The state supreme court has decided that the so-called "jag cure law" is unconstitutional because it applies only to convicts of over 50,000 population and it is limited in its benefits to a certain number in each county—one per cent to each 10,000 population.

Knocks That Suicide Story. Washington, Nov. 15.—Surgeon General Sternberg has prepared statistics making a comparison of cases of suicides and homicides which occurred in the army during the years of 1808 and 1809 compared with the ten years between 1888 and 1897. It shows that there were relatively fewer suicides during those two years than during the previous decade, the percentages being respectively about 27 and 62.

DIES ON HOME JOURNEY.

News of Death of Private Tomlinson Confirmed—Cable Callings.

Cable, Nov. 15.—Later reports received by Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Tomlinson confirm the news of the death of their son, Private I. H. Tomlinson, of Company D, 39th infantry, in the Philippines. He died of chronic dysentery on the transport Meade, en route from Manila to San Francisco. Deceased was born southeast of Cable, Feb. 15, 1875, and died Oct. 25, 1900. He was a member of Aledo lodge, M. W. of A., and carried insurance. Besides his father and mother, he leaves three brothers, Byron D., Thomas and Alex.


