STORIES OF THE STAGE

"One touch of nature makes the whole world kin." Such is the motto of Eleanor Merron's quaint rural drama, "The Dairy Farm," which comes to the Burtis tomorrow, matinee and evening. The play is said to contain that touch of nature to a remarkable extent, and therein lies its great charm. It is an idyll among modern stage plays, a play that makes the jaded playgoer feel after he has witnessed it that the world is better than he thought it was before; that the sun is brighter, and life altogether more worth living than it had seemed to be before seeing the play. Farm and village scenes all—a simple, homely story of the loves and hates, the nobler and meaner natures, the comic and tragic occurrences that help to make up the sum of human existence in rural communities as elsewhere. This is the foundation of "The Dairy Farm." The interpreting company Manager Wallick has provided is said to be an excellent one and includes Grace Hopkins, John Milton, Blanche Carlyle, Sarah Ward, Theodore Rook, Harry Dunkerson, J. H. Hollingshead, Catharine Carlisle, Nelly Russell, William Walters, and the veteran comedian, John Dillon.

The Chicago Symphony orchestra gives the first number in the Y. M. C. A. entertainment course at Harper's theatre tomorrow evening.

The drum major of the famous 48th Highlanders' band, Roderick Donald MacLennan, is almost as celebrated throughout Canada as is his bandmaster Slatter himself. Mr. MacLennan is the finest specimen of manhood in all Canada and it is doubtful if a more magnificently built man lives in the world today. He stands about seven feet and (unlike almost every other extremely tall man) is built in perfect proportion to his great height. With his great bushy towering two feet above his head and wearing his handsome kilted regimentals, he makes a most striking figure as he walks ahead of the bandmen. Bandmaster Slatter is over six feet in height himself and is a splendidly built, athletic man and his bandmen are fine men physically, but they all look small indeed beside the tall, Scottish-Canadian who carries the huge baton at the head of the regiment. All eyes will be on the big man in kilts when the band marches from the depot in this city. The band will appear at Harper's theatre Dec. 5.




