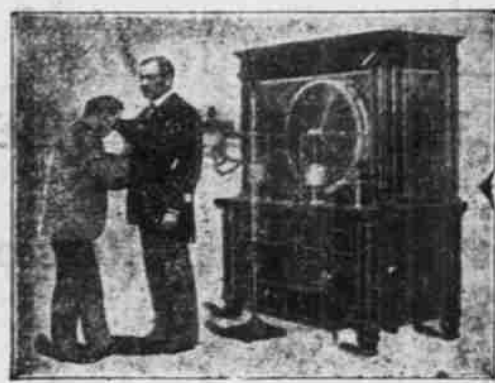

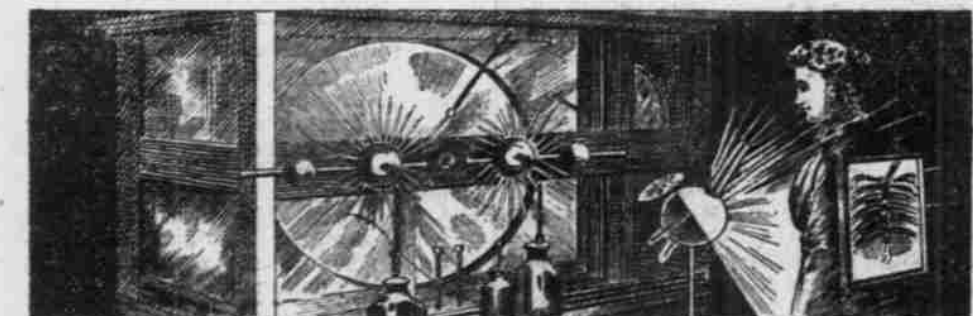

## DAVENPORT DOINGS

The directors of the Scott County Savings bank yesterday accepted the resignation of Charles Pasche, tendered some time ago on account of his new position as manager of the Swift interests at St. Joseph, Mo., which keeps him away from the city most of the time and will soon take him away for residence at St. Jo. Mr. Pasche's place on the board was filled by the election of Louis Hansen, Jr., to the directory.

At the Kuhnner blacksmith shop in East Davenport a boy had the misfortune to lose a finger. The lad is a brother of the proprietor of the shop. While at work his hand was caught in the machinery and before he was aware of it the digit was nipped off.

Gus Wilson, who with Henry Harbeck, Jr., was sent to Buffalo, N. Y., as a delegate to the American Federation of Musicians' convention from the Tri-City Musical union, has been elected executive for this district.

Yesterday there were instituted two injunction suits, authorized by the county attorney, and directed against Frank Traeger and Christine Engel, saloon proprietors of Scott county. The injunction suit is the direct result of the delinquency of the defendants in the payment of the mule tax.
