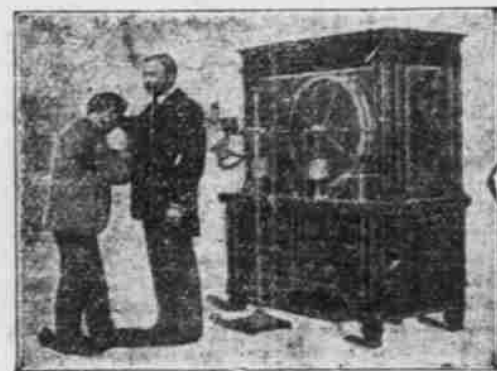

The 5-weeks-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Axel J. Swanson died this morning from the effects of burns received by the accidental overturning of a lighted lamp by the mother on a bed in which the little one was sleeping.

John H. Marsh, 36 years of age and living at 1721 Fifteenth street, was found today to be suffering with a light attack of smallpox. The residence was quarantined.

Henry Rader, an employee of the Moline Plow company, and Miss Nellie Deutz, 921 Sixteenth street, were married this morning at the First Methodist parsonage, Rev. M. V. Crumbaker officiating. The bride is an aunt of Mrs. Jesse Cowley and has resided with her the last five years.

George E. Holt, son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Holt, and Miss Jennie Byrd Cox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Cox of 2510 Sixth avenue, were married yesterday afternoon at the home of the bride at 5 o'clock. Rev. M. V. Crumbaker performing the ceremony. Mr. Holt is city editor of the Journal and one of the popular young newspaper men of the city.

The interesting announcement comes from Chicago that Charlie Brunstrom, the well known former clerk in Emil Heinbecker's drug store, was married June 17 to Miss Minnie Morgan, of Green Bay, Wis. A friend and former classmate, Rev. Adolf Hult, performed the ceremony and Mr. Brunstrom and bride are now at home to friends at 78 Lincoln avenue, Chicago. Assessor Samuels and his assistant, Fred Swenson, have completed the property rolls for the city and the books will be turned in to the county clerk's office at once. The totals show that there has been a gain of \$57,084 in the assessed value of property in Moline over last year, or a difference in the actual value of \$285,420. The total figures for the assessed valuation, which is one-fifth of the actual cash value, are: Lots—\$1,368,948, for 1901 \$1,326,883, gain for 1902 \$42,065. Personal—\$648,587, for 1901 \$634,121, gain for 1902 \$14,466. Lands—\$122,873, for 1901 \$132,330, gain for 1902 \$9,457. Full value for 1902 \$10,752,040; full value for 1901, \$10,466,620; gain for 1902, \$285,420.

After attempting suicide on three different occasions by taking morphine and only Monday threatened to end his existence by jumping into the river, John Benell, better known as "Jack," is now a prisoner in the county jail. For several months Benell has been drinking heavily, and during those numerous spells he has attempted to end his life by taking morphine, but the timely arrival of a doctor has each time thwarted his purpose. Monday he threatened to drown himself to the police and he was taken care of at the station over night and yesterday before Magistrate Olson he expressed his desire of keeping away from drink and he was given 120 days in the county jail.

About a week ago a fine bay mare owned by E. H. Wilson, the grocer, was injured on upper Fifth avenue by the caving in of the pavement. As a result of the injury, blood poisoning set in and the animal died. Mr. Wilson will look to the city to pay the damage, which amounts to \$125.

The funeral of the late John Hildar Knebel took place at 9 o'clock this morning from the home, 1326 Twelfth avenue, and at 10 o'clock from the Swedish Methodist church. The remains were given a military burial by Company F and the Spanish-American war veterans. The services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Burrell and Rev. Johnson, pastor of the church.

Robert Daws, of Milan, an employee of the Davis company, on Sylvan island, accidentally cut his left foot badly today with an ax. The tissues were cut to the bone. Dr. G. G. Craig, Jr., dressed the wound and the man was sent home on a car.

Coroner Eckhart was called to this city this morning to hold an inquest over the remains of Magnus Sandvine, who died about midnight at his home, 314 Fourth avenue. Sandvine was subject to epileptic fits, and last Friday had a bad attack from which he had apparently recovered. He was discovered last night in his bed in a dying condition. The jury decided that death had been caused by cardiac disease brought on by repeated epileptic attacks.

Three wandering cigar makers applied to Dr. Long at East Moline for medical attendance this morning, and it was learned that they had been eating foodstuffs that they had mistaken for mushrooms. Two of them, H. C. Morsche and E. C. Schultz, were able to be removed to the Moline city hospital, but the other, John Hopkins, was in a serious condition this afternoon. The men claim Memphis, Tenn., as their home.
