LAST OF THE "GRAY-BEARDS"
Death of an Iowa Veteran of a Noted Regiment from Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia., July 5.—Alexander McGarrah, father of J. D. McGarrah, an Iowa pioneer and a member of the famous Gray-Beard regiment which went out from Iowa and saw service in the civil war, is dead at the home of his son, 403 Eleventh street. McGarrah's death was due to old age and heart failure.

He is believed to be the last survivor of the Thirty-Seventh Iowa regiment, better known as the Gray-Beard regiment, he having ranked as second lieutenant in Company I of that organization, serving three years in that capacity. His son, J. D. McGarrah, was also in the civil war.

Business Done by Congress.
Washington, July 5.—Benjamin S. Platt, enrolling clerk of the senate, has prepared a statement which shows that the past session was distinguished by the large amount of business transacted. In the house 15,572 bills and joint resolutions were introduced, and in the senate 6,450. There were sent to the president 956 bills originating in the house and 547 senate bills, a total of 1,503. The senate passed 1,090 of the measures originating with it and the house 1,386 of its own bills.

Gold Interests to Control.
Carbondale, Ill., July 5.—Vice President Ransel Harding and other officials of the Iron Mountain railroad spent Wednesday at Thebes, where the beginning of work on a bridge to span the Mississippi river is to begin. Their presence leads additional force to the opinion that the gold interests will control the bridge and the Chicago and Eastern Illinois.

They Got a Pleasant Surprise.
Scranton, Pa., July 5.—The mine employees of the Pennsylvania Coal company, now operated by the Erie, who remained faithful to the company during the strike were given a pleasant surprise when upon opening their pay envelopes they found their wages had been increased 10 per cent.

Kansas Socialists.
Emporia, Kan., July 5.—The socialists of Kansas, after their state convention here adopted a platform and nominated a full state ticket. A. S. McAllister, an engineer of Harington, was unanimously named for governor, and John M. Parr, a Topeka house painter and decorator, for lieutenant governor.

Fare Is Wealthy.
Huntington, W. Va., July 5.—The jury in the case of the state against John Farr for the murder of Owen Ross failed to reach a verdict, and was discharged. This is the fourth trial. Farr is a prominent Republican and wealthy.
