He will return Saturday in time to be present at the adjourned meeting of the city council Saturday evening when the work left over from last Monday evening will be taken up. Mr. Skinner's resignation as alderman from the Second ward will be presented at this meeting after which a special election will be called to fill the vacancy. A. V. 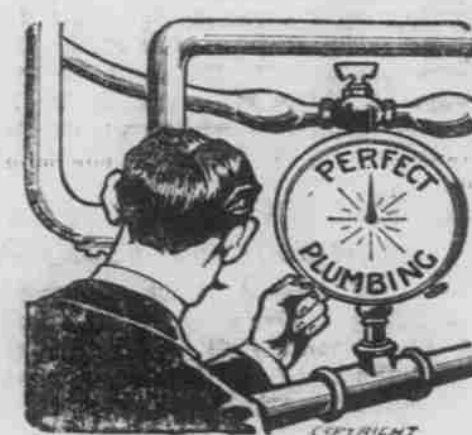
